BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. - The historic Bellows Falls Opera House, which had been closed because of the Covid-19 pandemic for the past 15 months recently reopened its doors, June 11, on the Square in Bellows Falls and is officially making a comeback!

Over the last several months, the newly formed Rockingham Entertainment Development Ltd. - or RED - a volunteer nonprofit group led by artist and Bellows Falls resident Charlie Hunter, had been entertaining the option of transforming BFOH into a nonprofit organi-

However, with the help and guidance of Bellows Falls Town Manager Scott Pickup, it was decided to go in a different direction, although they did receive a 501(c)(3) designation this spring. Along with Hunter, the other RED directors include Sean Long and Marty Gallagher.

"I have been very impressed with Scott Pickup," Hunter said in a recent interview. "Once the Shuttered Venue Operating Grants were announced, whereby entities that had run venues were now able to apply for grants in order to reopen, Scott suggested a structure whereby the Opera House would still remain under the municipal umbrella, with RED acting more like a consultant."

RED will be working closely with the BFOH staff, including operations coordinator Jenn Heidbrink, facility coordinator

The main goal for RED is to help develop systems that make the overall operation run more smoothly, as well as in the immediacy, getting the new BFOH website built and "live" within the next couple months, allowing for a variety of options for the public.

'Folks will be able to buy movie tickets, choose their seats for live performances, purchase the popular 'triple-up' concession deal, underwrite Classic Film Wednesdays, and rent the Opera House - when it would otherwise be dark and empty for private events," Hunter said. "Of course, you will still be able to buy movie tickets and snacks with cash at the door."

The BFOH will continue to offer first run, general-interest movies as the primary focus. The Classic Film Wednesday series will also resume June 30 at 7 p.m., leading off with a showing of the classic comedy "The Jerk," starring Steve Martin and Bernadette Pe-

"We are aiming for a mix of movies and live events, ranging from concerts to multiweek theatrical performances," Hunter added.

The Theatre Committee is also starting to look at long-term improvements for the facility, such as replacing outdated equipment and upgrading the "lower theater," allowing for a second venue for special-interest films and a more intimate concert and cabaret space.

"It is the belief of the BFOH staff and of RED, that the Opera House has the potential to be a real economic driver for the downtown area," Hunter concluded. "We are looking forward to working with businesses and residents alike, towards making that

Westminster School Elections plan to vote

WESTMINSTER, Vt. -Westminster was conditionally approved May 19, 2021 by the Vermont State Board of Education to reinstate its local town school district. This followed months of efforts from election by citizens to vote to withdraw from the forced merger that created a new union school district with the towns of Athens and Grafton.

While that union school district has functioned amicably, there have been none of the cost savings or efficiencies ascribed as among the purposes of the forced merger. Thankfully, in the process of making the merger work during the past several years, the quality of education provided to the students has not suffered as a result of the merger. Neither has the quality of education been enhanced by the merger. Westminster, Athens, and Grafton all remain part of the Windham Northeast Supervisory Union. Now that Westminster has been conditionally authorized to run its school independently from Athens and Grafton, there are steps to follow as prescribed by the Vermont State Board of Education.

The first of those is to elect a town School Board. That election is scheduled for June 30 to be held at Westminster Town Hall from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Absentee ballots are also available. Per the state's order, a three-person board is to be elected for staggered terms. That newly elected School Board will then work with

the members of the Windham Northeast Union Elementary School District to agree on financial terms for the withdrawal of Westminster from the union school district. That process is not expected to be contentious. a petition and subsequent It is clear that the remaining loan incurred to build Westminster Center School's gymnasium is a Westminster debt.

Following development of that financial agreement, a vote of the voters in Athens, Grafton, and Westminster must be held to approve that proposed agreement. That vote is scheduled for Aug. 31 simultaneously in the three towns. It is anticipated that Westminster voters will also be asked to vote on that date to expand the number of members on the town School Board from three to five and to elect those two new board members on that date as well.

Once all these steps have been taken, the State Board of Education will review Westminster's progress at their meeting Sept. 15. With fulfillment of the requirements, the town School Board will become fully operational July 1, 2022. These upcoming elections are a key and necessary part of the process. So, Westminster voters, please mark both of these important dates, June 30 and Aug. 31, and plan to vote.

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

The Wall

Perhaps you've heard tell of the wall, or maybe you took part in the 1960s. Chester's downtown used be very busy. Kids have always needed a place to hang out. The wall at Brookside Cemetery was Chester's hangout. In the late 1960s, there were hundreds of kids in town. My graduating class alone had 64.

The wall entry

The driveway came off the road to the cemetery, around behind the Civil War monument continuing along in front of the wall, before it curved again and returned to the street. Kids sat on the wall waiting for something to happen. The kids with cars neatly backed them up in front of the wall. There were often '55 Chevys or other rods parked there.

Summer evenings

Try to imagine downtown Chester in the late '60s. Al's IGA was a grocery store where Blair Books is today. Chester had two banks at the time. The banks were at either end of the Chester Inn – now the Fullerton Chester Drug Store was next to the inn on the right. Down Common Street was a laundromat where Southern Pie is today, the American Legion and Central Vermont Power Co. Much of Chester's business was conducted in the down-

Sitting on the wall gave us an excellent view of the goings on. Girls our age walked by with their shorts and halter-tops. We were all coming of age and experiencing life.

The loop

Sometimes we got ahold of a six-pack of beer. No, we weren't old enough to drink, but why let a little thing like age interfere with a good time? We'd take a

ride up around the "Loop." The loop ran from Lover's Lane Road all the way around through the hills to the Chester Reservoir and back down to Route 11. The road in those days wasn't maintained so you drove real slow picking your way through mud or over rocks. This was the perfect time to have a couple beers without fear of being molested by the law.

One night I was driving Arnold's '64 VW bug. I had backed it in beside the other rigs. I don't remember now who with, but I took a ride with someone around the loop, leaving the VW parked in front of the wall. When I came back, the Volkswagen was gone.

The kids sitting on the wall all played dumb. No one knew anything. I began to fear what Arnold might do. Eventually someone said to check the cemetery. Sure enough, there it was in the rear of the cemetery near the brook. The kids had pushed it down there.

Parking

I think "parking" is something most will know. Usually, with only a few dollars in our pocket, we took a girl to the A&W in Springfield and then for a ride, quite often around the loop. There were a number of places where you could pull off the road to do some necking. We had AM radios in our cars. On Friday nights WKBW came in crystal clear. KBW was out Buffalo way.

There was always the chance that other kids riding the loop would see your car. They knew what you were doing. They would sneak up on your car and pound on the hood or trunk hoping to catch you in a compromising position.

Bill Clemons was Chief of Police until about 1962. He was followed by John Whitaker and then Keith Grimes. Sometimes the chief would park his cruiser alongside us kids' cars. This always made us nervous. We would be as polite as we could possibly be until the chief got a call and

I remember once we had a six-pack of beer that we had hidden on the cemetery side of the wall. Here we sat smoking cigarettes and drinking beer. We all watched out for each other. I remember Bud Nadeau saying, "Ronnie, here comes your father." Fear set in. I prayed Arnold wouldn't

stop.

The photo with this article is from my 1969 Chester High School yearbook. We chose to have our class photo taken at the wall. You can see the Class of '69 standing on or in front of the wall.

This week's old saying is from my mother. June was driving when a pregnant woman came out of Al's IGA. She didn't bother to look to see if any cars were coming. My mother stood on the brakes, rolled down her window, and said, "You can get knocked down just as easy."



Fishing access areas not safe for swimming

REGION - The Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department reminds the public not to swim at fishing access areas due to safety concerns. The primary use of the fishing access areas is for launching and retrieving motorboats.

The Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department maintains 196 developed fishing access areas on lakes and rivers throughout the state. These areas have allowed uses determined by law, and swimming is not one of them.

The access areas were pur-

chased and are maintained with funds derived from the sale of fishing licenses and motorboat registrations, as well as a federal excise tax on fishing equipment, fishing tackle, and gasoline for motorboats. These funding sources explicitly prohibit activities that are in conflict with fishing and boating.

Fish & Wildlife regulations prohibit certain uses of fishing access areas including, but not limited to swimming, littering, camping, picnicking, making a fire, parking of vehicles not related to priority uses, and commercial activity.


"It's great that people want to get out in the water, but a boat ramp is not the right place to go swimming," said Mike Wichrowski who oversees the Fishing Access Area Program. "There's a reason motorboats aren't allowed in swimming areas, and swimming isn't allowed at fishing access areas - it's simply not safe."

Vermont State Game Wardens often respond to incidents involving people swimming at fishing access areas. In some cases people, including children, are swimming right at the boat ramps while boats were being launched, risking injury or preventing the launching of

"We understand that people want to go swimming, especially during hot weather, but we are urging folks to swim at locally approved swimming areas," said Colonel Jason Batchelder. "Finding a safe swimming area is easy in most communities. Just ask at a general store or other place where people gather."

Protect Grassland Birds by mowing later -

REGION - Bobolinks, meadowlarks, Savannah sparrows, and grasshopper sparrows enrich our summers with their songs, but some of these species are in decline due to the loss of appropriate grassland habitat.

Landowners can make a difference by altering the times

of year they mow fields. The Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department is encouraging landowners to help these beloved species by waiting a little longer to mow to give these birds a chance to complete their nest-

"People maintain fields and

meadows in Vermont for a variety of reasons, from commercial hayfields and grazing pastures, to simple aesthetic beauty," said Doug Morin, biologist for the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department. "Mowing is the most common way to maintain grasses, but if mowed early in the summer, grassland birds will lose their nests and

chicks."

Bobolinks build nests among the grasses and wildflowers of fields and meadows. When bobolinks are present, other grassland bird species such as Savannah sparrows and grasshopper sparrows, may also be nesting among the grasses. Deer fawns, wild turkey chicks, and other animals take refuge in the grass and are also at risk by mowing too early.

According to Morin, land-

owners who mow their fields for aesthetic reasons can maintain these fields and accommodate nesting birds simply by cutting later in the summer, preferably after Aug. 15.



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

SEVCA offering free child tax credit services —

WESTMINSTER, Vt. - Qualifying families can receive advance payments of the Child Tax Credit in monthly payments starting this summer. The total Child Tax Credit is worth \$3,600 for children 5 and under, and \$3,000 for children 6 through 17. Families could receive up to \$300 per month for younger children and \$250 per month for older children. The IRS will use information from 2019 or 2020 tax returns to determine if you are qualified. SEVCA's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program can help families who aren't required to file a tax return provide in-

formation to the IRS. SEVCA can also help if you have not received the first two rounds of Economic Impact Payments.

Information on eligibility requirements for advance Child Tax Credit payments and Economic Impact Payments can be found on SEVCA's website: www.sevca.org/news/330-sevca-offers-free-child-tax-credit-services. People who filed a 2019 or 2020 tax return or submitted information to the IRS last year to register for the Economic Impact Payments do not need to take action to receive child tax credits.

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Federal mask requirements remain for public transportation

REGION – The Vermont Agency of Transportation reminds passengers that federal mask requirements remain in place across all transportation networks, including buses, trains, and commercial aircrafts.

"The recent lifting of the state Covid-19 restrictions is welcome news to us all," said AOT Secretary Joe Flynn. "We are excited for the return of Amtrak passenger rail service and intercity bus service on July 19 – and we thank all riders for their patience and understanding of the remaining federal rules."

While state restrictions have been lifted, it is important to note that Vermont's transportation systems are bound by federal rules and requirements. Both the Transportation Security Agency and the Center for Disease Control are requiring facemasks to be used until Sept. 13, 2021. This includes passengers on Amtrak trains, intercity buses, and all commercial flights at any airport facility.

AOT will alert the public if federal guidance changes and asks all passengers for their continued support of this federal requirement.

HCRS receives 2021 Summer Matters for All grant ———

SPRINGFIELD, Vt. -Health Care and Rehabilitation Services, southeastern Vermont's nonprofit community mental health and developmental disability services agency, was recently selected to receive \$63,945 in funding from the Summer Matters for All grant program. According to Gov. Phil Scott, the Summer Matters for All grant program will award up to \$3.85 million to programs in 13 counties of Vermont, with the goal of expanding access to summer enrichment opportunities for K-12 youth this summer.

This grant money will support HCRS' summer therapeutic programming for youth currently engaged in services at HCRS, ages 8-16,

who may have no other access to summer recreational programs. Division Director Jennifer Smith, LICSW states, "This funding allows us to provide a truly therapeutic and rich summer experience for the youth we serve. Having the ability to provide meaningful day trips, visiting parks and pools, and purchasing supplies and equipment will allow youth to truly engage in fun, therapeutic activities. This is such a great gift!"

Gov. Scott has put an emphasis on helping Vermont kids recover from the pandemic and the isolation it caused, including creating opportunities for them to safely reconnect with their peers and communities. The purpose of the grant program is to increase access to summer enrichment opportu-

nities for K-12 youth statewide this summer. This was a highly competitive process with 188 proposals submitted totaling more than \$7.4 million in requests, far exceeding available funds

The grants, funded by federal dollars secured by Sen. Bernie Sanders and administered by Vermont Afterschool, were awarded to a variety of programs, including summer camps, libraries, municipalities, teen centers, nonprofit social service organizations, and more. The goal of the funding is to expand the number of weeks and available slots, as well as to increase affordability and accessibility of summer programs. These offerings will supplement school-based programs, as districts in Vermont received separate federal funds to support summer learning and afterschool programs.

"Summer is the perfect opportunity to help kids reconnect and recharge. We are incredibly grateful to our state leaders and policymakers for their commitment to the development of the Summer Matters for All grant program," stated Holly Morehouse, executive director of Vermont Afterschool, within the grant materials. "With this funding, communities and youth-serving organizations across the state will be able to create a great summer for Vermont children and youth that will help them make new memories and emerge from the pandemic strong, resilient, and hopeful."
