HCRS to pay \$170,000 settlement for violating False Claims Act

Tuesday, June 29, 2021, the Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud and Residential Abuse Unit announced a settlement with Health Care & Rehabilitation Services of Southeastern Vermont of Springfield resolving allegations that HCRS violated the Vermont False Claims

The settlement, reached in collaboration with the Office of the United States Attorney for the District of Vermont, resolves claims that HCRS improperly submitted Medicaid claims for services provided by an employee who was on the Office of the Inspector General, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services exclusion list and barred from receiving payments from federally funded healthcare programs.

For a period of nearly 10 years, HCRS employed an individual identified on OIG-HHS' exclusion list and submitted claims

MONTPELIER, Vt. - On on the employee's behalf for reimbursement to Medicaid, in violation of the Vermont False Claims Act. In addition, the United States Attorney's Office for the District of Vermont has concluded that HCRS violated the federal False Claims Act.

HCRS CEO, George Karabakakis, Ph.D., said, "We immediately took steps to notify the authorities as soon as we became aware of the employment issue with this staff member. We have been up front about our agency's oversight of this personnel matter, and we took responsibility for the federal and state payments we'd received erroneously, returning all of the related revenue along with a substantial penalty. As a community mental health agency, we regret our error and recognize the importance of ensuring all employment guidelines are followed; we have since strengthened our procedures to prevent a reoccurrence."

HCRS has agreed to pay to the state of Vermont and the United States a total of \$170,037.76, of which Vermont Medicaid will receive \$101,254.61 in program restitution. The settlement amount reflects a cooperation credit in light of HCRS's self-disclosure of the violation, assistance with the investigation, and voluntary adoption of remedial measures to guard against improper employment and claim submission in the fu-

"We thank HCRS for bringing this to the state's attention and for their cooperation," said Attorney General Donovan. "HCRS provides important care and services to some of the state's most vulnerable Vermonters. Performing required background checks and complying with state and federal law

"The Claremont Soup Kitchen is very excited to have the opportunity to partner with the Upper Valley Land Trust to bring fresh produce to our guests," said Claremont Soup Kitchen Executive Director Cindy Stevens. "The Claremont Soup Kitchen has many guests that come daily to see what is offered on our farmstand. This partnership will allow us to provide many more options. We are truly thankful to be able to offer such a great service to our community."

This collaborative Food Pantry Garden is run primarily by volunteers and UVLT is actively seeking community members interested in helping out in the garden. The garden is located at Up on the Hill Conservation area, a property that UVLT owns and manages off of Richardson Road in Charlestown with land in Claremont, and Unity, N.H. as well. This 1,100-acre property is mostly forested but also has excellent agricultural land. This year UVLT set aside 5,000 squarefeet and turned it into a garden with a variety of seasonal vegetables.

"Using the agricultural land that we own for the good of everyone is really important to us," said UVLT's Programs Director Alison Marchione, who

"Our conservation areas aren't just about trails and mont Soup Kitchen and Food recreation - we can do more Pantry to grow food for those than that. There are people in gry and we have the ability to play a role in alleviating that problem. Conservation land is for everyone."

The Food Pantry Garden Program began in 2019 at Brookmead Conservation Area in Norwich, Vt. After two successful seasons and 4,000 pounds of produce donated to Willing Hands, a local food reclamation and distribution nonprofit, UVLT applied for a New Hampshire Charitable Foundation grant to expand the program to Up on the Hill. The foundation's environmental opportunity grant program provides small one-time grants to New Hampshire organizations involved in the intersection of community and environment. Now, UVLT is asking volunteers to turn that generous funding into food by volunteering at the Food Pantry Garden to feed our neighbors in need.

Karina Ricker was excited to break ground on the new project this spring. "I wanted the opportunity to learn about land conservation, food security, and food systems. This internship seemed like the perfect way to learn about the intersection of all three things," said Ricker, UVLT's Patchen Miller intern. "The chance to help expand the program to a whole new area and be in on the ground floor of that work was

also really appealing to me."

UVLT is a nonprofit land conservancy that works in 45 Vermont and New Hampshire towns in the Connecticut River watershed, providing conservation leadership, tools, and expertise. The lands UVLT protects are places where people of all ages can participate in the stewardship of natural resources, learn about forests and farming, and enjoy being in nature. Founded by Upper Valley residents in 1985, UVLT has conserved more than 52,000 acres of land and owns and manages 22 conservation areas. These include working farms, forested ridges, wildlife habitat, water resources, trails, and scenic landscapes. Most of the conserved land remains in private ownership, protected by permanent deeds known as conservation ease-

Volunteers run the gardens and plant, weed, water, and harvest produce. UVLT is actively seeking more volunteers to join their efforts. Community workdays are Thursday nights from 3-6 p.m. Individual work and projects can be arranged, and service and business groups are encouraged to reach out for specialized service days. All ages are welcome, including children under 15 with an adult. No experience is necessary. For more information, to go www.uvlt.org/ food-pantry-garden.

Joint Board discusses demolition of historic church on Atkinson Street

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. -On Tuesday, June 29, the Joint Board of the Rockingham Selectboard and Bellows Falls Trustees discussed updates on 66 Atkinson Street.

Built in 1835 as the first Methodist church in Bellows Falls, the building has commanded attention at the intersections of School and Atkinson streets ever since. It was owned by the YMCA for 50 years and in 2015 was exchanged for one dollar.

Current owner Christopher Glennon hoped to save and preserve the historic structure, but the location, across the street from the historic district, made it ineligible for federal funding and the cost of rehabilitation is significant. Glennon is currently working on a Quit Claim Deed with the town claiming ownership by Sep-

Municipal Manager Scott Pickup told the Joint Board that Northern Heritage Mills President Gerald DeMuro had expressed interest in the building. Northern Heritage Mills of Claremont, N.H., is a nonprofit educational organization. Founded in 2001, NHM promotes the preservation of historical technologies through STEM educa-

Pickup explained that correspondence so far was only by email. He had shared the 2018 engineering report with DeMuro who responded with maintained interest Among other concerns, the report highlighted structural instability, collapse of ceiling materials, and fallen slate

roof shingles. The engineer had recommended demolition at

Two years ago, the Joint Board had met with Glennon to request that he stabilize and secure the roof and address other concerns from the engineer's report by the fall.

Glennon had removed debris and ceiling materials to lessen the load, but Trustees observed the roof still remained insecure. They proposed jersey barriers and fencing to surround the building in the fall of 2019.

At Tuesday's meeting, Pickup said, "Ideally, we would do it over the summer, but the demolition rates are much higher in the summer." He said they could save substantial costs if the building was taken down before the winter. It would cost between \$75,000 to \$100,000 to take the building down. Pickup explained that the village has invested \$20,000 in fencing, barriers, asbestos removal, and

Trustee James McAuliffe commented that if NHM was still interested "More power to

him, but I certainly agree with [Pickup] that we need to move forward before the winter."

Pickup added, "We'd be hard pressed to get through another winter season without some sort of catastrophic failure." He had told DeMuro that

'there was a hard deadline," so if he was serious he needed to send a proposal as soon as possible. Pickup had received nothing formal as of June 29.

Board member Rick Cowan asked about funding. Pickup said federal funding was requested, and Community Development Block Grant funds might help with the demolition expenses.

Discussion ensued with what could be done with the lot after demoliton. Ideas included a dog park, a green space, a community center, a garden, or parking lot. Pickup hoped they could improve the intersection at School and Atkinson streets and make it safer

Pickup concluded that the goal was for a decision to be made by Sept. 30 at the next scheduled Joint Board meeting.

TOWNSHEND, Vt. - This the skills and behaviors necessary to navigate the professional world received the credential and marched at graduation with teal honor cords, denoting their achievement.

Twin Valley's Janelle Fisher and Tanya Wheeler, and Leland & Gray's Dylan Greenwood also received the BDCC's Windham Work Ready Scholarship for exemplifying the accountability, initiative, professionalism, positivity, and resilience needed to excel in the professional world.

Students started their journey in January with an overview of growing employment sectors in Windham County, throughout Vermont and nationally. In addition to traditional fouryear colleges, students learned about alternative pathways to postsecondary success such as credentialing programs, community colleges, and jobs that

offer tuition reimbursement. Students then explored their passions through interest inventories, research, and goal mapping. Throughout the course, they learned optimal practices for applications, resume writing, and interview preparation. They learned about professional body language, verbiage, and appearance, how to effectively resolve conflict, how to talk to a supervisor, and how taking initiative and being resilient can make the difference between success and failure on the job and in life.

During one of the final challenges in the course, students were paired with professionals connected to their field of interest for informational interviews. Students worked with employers from sectors like healthcare, civil engineering, law enforcement, marketing, software engi-

neering, equine therapy, cosmetology, and the electrical trades and had the opportunity to ask questions about what it is really like to be an employee in that profession.

P3 is a BDCC Workforce Center of Excellence program based on Southeastern Vermont Economic Development Strategies to increase the size and quality of the workforce. BDCC is a private, nonprofit economic development organization that serves as a catalyst for industrial and commercial growth throughout Southeastern Vermont, and is one of 12 RDCs throughout Vermont.

The course was designed in response to local employers and college recruiters who identified the need for enhanced employability and soft skills among their new hires and freshmen cohorts. They believe that a greater focus on improving these skills will increase the likelihood of young people making it through their probationary periods at work or their freshman year of college. Senior Survival will continue to be a required course at Leland & Gray next year, and P3 has leveraged the successes of the program at Twin Valley to create a credit-bearing course offered to sophomores and juniors in conjunction with their new entrepreneurship program. proach will ensure that every senior confidently graduates with a clear and solid plan for post-secondary success in fu-





The old man

Lee Kendall is Kim's older man didn't like, acbrother by two years. Back about 1985 Lee wrote a few stories about growing up on the farm. Today, Kim owns the property. Lee mentions a cousin John on the Suwanee River. John is Kendall Thurston. The old man is Lee's father, Nelson. Below is one of Lee's stories. The photo is Nelson's gravestone that Kendall carved from pool table slate.

"Down at the edge of the property under a leafless butternut tree a gravestone sticks up through winter's snow. The old man is buried there or rather his ashes are, well most of them anyway. My youngest brother, Gale, strewed several handfuls of them among the trees and stone fence posts that mark the boundaries. The old man always said in his later years he was never leaving the place and it appears he was

"The property is only two and one half acres, more or less. Lawn, shade, and fruit trees of all kinds have been planted and cut and more planted at the whim of eight generations of farmers. The old man's butternut and exotic poplars dominate the scene now. They are slowly replacing the one hundred and fifty year old maples that are starting to die along the edge of the short driveway.

"After my brothers and I graduated from high school and left home the old man couldn't keep up his home businesses. The cider press was dismantled and sold as was the sugaring arch and all the paraphernalia that went with it. From then on until he died the old man concentrated on gardening and planting trees.

"He loved his garden and grew all the common garden stock, plus little known and not much sought after curative and healthful plants. He had a few regular customers who drove long distances to buy them. Pumpkins were the big seller though, mountains of them for Halloween.

"The only plant the old

tually I should say hated, was poison ivy. It was the bane of his existence. He was so allergic if he saw some while out hunting or fishing he would detour hundreds of yards.

"There was a small growth of it at the far edge of his pumpkin patch. He tried to burn it one fall and caught a horrendous case from the smoke blowing on him. The next summer


he tried swathing himself in rain gear and spraying, but it did no good. He caught it again and the ivy lives to this day.

The land, the house and the three weathered barns attached to it, one after another in the old New England style, belong to Kim now.

"Kim hasn't married yet so he always has a place in the old nine room farmhouse for a guest or two. Various cousins, aunts, friends, and friends of friends stay for a day, a week, a summer, or a winter depending on their vague plans. It seems like there is always someone there from some distant place with an interesting tale of travel

"My cousin, John, lives in a treehouse perched over the Suwanee River with his pet skunk, during the winter. Summers he usually spends at Kim's. He and the old man used to argue, disagree, and practical joke each other constantly. Neither he nor the old man could resist trying to get a little dig into the other. Depending on the day, they're either best of friends Kim and Lee Kendall. or plotting to kill each other.

'The old man didn't like the noise and late night parties at the house so he lived in the silo. He had it set up quite comfortably in four floors. The first was the kitchen and living room, the second bedroom, the third closet and storage. On the fourth you could pull back the domed canopy for a birds-eye view of the fields and old stone walls.

"As much as the old man and John did and didn't get along, John spent a summer after the old man's death living in the grapevine covered silo. He also took the time to carve the gravestone under the butternut tree.

"It's a nice stone but I believe the old man would swear and b---h till he was blue if he could see it, for carved with exquisite care and attention to detail up the sides of the gray slate around the name and dates are winding vines of poison ivy."





John C. Bacon, 1938-2021



ST. 
Mentors and youths who would like to participate in this year's program must preregister with the Refuge by Friday, Aug. 6. Participation in the program will be limited to 30 enrollees.


All mentors and young hunters must attend the one-day training session Saturday, Aug. 21, with instruction beginning at 8 a.m. at the Franklin County Sportsman's Club on Route 36 in St. Albans. The training session will be held rain or shine, so participants should dress appropriately. All youth participants should bring the shotgun they intend to use for hunting to the training for a patterning

Junior hunters and their mentors, once they complete the training, are awarded exclusive use of several premier hunting areas at Missisquoi National Wildlife Refuge for the first four weekends of the waterfowl hunting season. Juniors are only permitted to shoot for the first two weekends, and mentors will be permitted to shoot alongside their juniors the last two weekends of the junior hunt. Blind sites and hunting dates for the junior hunters are determined by a lottery conducted at the annual training session.



VINE Sanctuary Pasture Pals education program

SPRINGFIELD, Vt. – Did you know chickens are dinosaurs? Or that cows create families? Has a goat helped your art project? All these experiences and more happen during Pasture Pals at VINE Sanctuary. 

Be careful when renting vehicles for vacation

REGION - Based on reports from law enforcement. a significant number of scams appear to have grown in relation to vacation travel. Recently, I warned about fraud occurring in the promotion of vacation hospitality locations. Vehicle rentals pose another opportunity for scammers to separate us from our money. They are well aware that when we fly to a vacation spot we almost always need to rent a vehicle. They are also aware that rental cars are now marketed at a significantly greater cost. Weekly rentals a year ago were available

for under \$250; the same rental cars today are running over \$1,000.

The Federal Trade Commission cently issued a warning refake garding car companies, websites, and customer serdepartthat ments have the look and feel of legitimacy. The

catch: most ask for prepayment with gift cards or debit cards. Legitimate rental companies request credit card numbers and, in fact, many will not accept debit cards.

The scam scenario looks something like this: You need to rent a car for the summer vacation in Colorado so you do a general Google search for "rental cars." The search reveals 3,84 billion results in under a second. Wow! Of course you see the usual companies - Hertz, Avis, Alamo – as well as travel consolidators - Priceline, Expedia, Travelocity. But, you also ee names vou likely do not recognize. Prominently featured in the results are prices you can hardly believe so you click on the website link where you see attractive cars at very low prices. The website provides a toll-free number to contact customer service where you can verify the fee and prepay with a debit card or gift card. In addition, the webpage displays several testimonial state-

ments from happy customers. Once again, wow! You provide debit card information and receive a confirmation number. Two weeks later, at the arrival airport, you discover that the rental company doesn't exist and the money is gone.

This scenario is playing out for travelers nationwide. How do you avoid the scam?

Begin with the key pieces of advice: Is this too good to be true? Did you allow emotion over the opportunity to overtake logic? Did you give in to crowd mentality as exhibited by the testimonials? Was the scarcity of rental cars driving your decision? If the answer to one or more of these is "yes," you've fallen "under the ether," a heightened state of emotion.

The FTC provides some very clear recommendations when renting a car.

1. Research the company – not using their website. Enter the company name in your browser with the word "scam," "review," or "complaint" to see if any negative records or bad customer experiences are noted. Visiting the website for Trip Advisor, Consumer Reports, or the Better Business Bureau can be helpful.

2. Verify deals with the company directly. Scammers are very capable of creating lookalike websites, so contact the company using its official website. Do not use a search engine as the criminals can actually pay to have their website appear at the top of listings.

3. As noted previously, use a credit card, never gift cards or debit cards. Aside from fringe benefits like insurance coverage and rewards, credit card charges can be disputed. Gift card and debit card funds can disappear without a trace.

As with so many of our activities today, we need to apply vigilance and possibly a degree of skepticism in order to avoid becoming a victim of fraud. Happy and safe travels!
