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## Ludlow finalizes board and committee appointments

LUDLOW, Vt. – The Ludlow Selectboard met for a special meeting on Monday, May 16 to make final decisions on several appointed positions on Ludlow's various boards and committees, including the newly formed Rental Registry Committee, Development Review Board, Planning Commission, and the Recreation Committee.

The selectboard appointed five Ludlow homeowners from nearly a dozen applicants to the newly formed Rental Registry Committee, which will have a total of eight committee members. Fire Chief Peter Kolenda, Charlie Rimer, Eric Alden, Noah Schmidt, and Penny Tripp were selected and will join selectboard members Justin Hyjek, Scott Baitz, and a yet unnamed member of the Planning Commission, to form the board of eight. Rose Goings, Ludlow's Director of Planning and Zoning, will also serve as an "ex officio" member, able to participate in the meetings, but without a vote.

Both Charlie Rimer and Noah Schmidt spoke to the challenges of finding affordable housing as a younger person who wants

to stay and live in Ludlow, both because of rising home prices and lack of affordable year-round apartment rentals. Both referred to the rental registry as a first step in dealing with the bigger issue of affordable housing.

Homeowner Eric Alden, who is not a full-time resident but does own rental property, has had experience with setting up a rental registry in Boston, and said that the rental registry does nothing to create additional rentals or make them more affordable, but would help the town make rental units safer. He agreed that the larger conversation was affordable housing. Alden said that, of his rental properties, half are seasonal rentals and half are rented to locals.

The board appointed three candidates, from a list of five, to open positions on the DRB: John Bohrer, Douglas Sheehan, and George Tucker Jr.

Douglas Sheehan was also appointed to the Board of Listers.

Judith Pullinen and Andrea Goldman were appointed from among five candidates to fill the two open positions on the Planning Commission.

The extensive list of appointed Town Officers that were up for renewal went

uncontested and were approved en masse by the board. Two positions, Tree Warden and Fence Viewer, were left vacant with Ralph Pace's recent move out of town. Phil Carter was appointed as Tree Warden and Charlie Rimer was appointed as Fence Viewer. The list of appointed Town Officers can be viewed in the town report.

The selectboard also appointed Joe Gurdak, Jeannie Stasz, and Patrick Gray to the Recreation Committee.

At the start of the meeting, the selectboard heard updates for, and confirmed their support of, the proposed mountain bike track being proposed on the "Back 40" behind the elementary school. At their last meeting in early May, the board agreed to move forward with the project, along with a tentative commitment for a \$10,000 funding match, but asked to hear answers concerning insurance coverage and whether Act 250 permitting would be needed, along with details about maintenance costs and personnel.

## Plymouth appoints Town Clerk, postpones tax sales

PLYMOUTH, Vt. – In the May 16 meeting, the Plymouth Selectboard officially announced their newly appointed Town Clerk, went over the town's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan, and agreed to delay the tax sales for the Hawk Properties.

After four "great interviews," the Plymouth Selectboard appointed new Town Clerk Jaclyn Olmstead on Monday, May 9, and she began working immediately. Chair Jay Kullman said in a recent interview, "Jaclyn has a well-rounded resume and work experience, and possesses good customer service and communications skills that are essential to the role."

Olmstead was appointed for a one-year position, which will require her to run for election at the end of the term. Kullman stated, "We are very confident that she'll do well in the role and be elected to the position [again, next year]."

At the beginning of the meeting, Steven Bauer, from Two Rivers-Ottawaquechee Regional Commission, made a presentation on the town's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan. The plan was last updated in 2015, and must be reviewed every six years, which TRORC assists with. The detailed document outlines a plan to mitigate, prepare, respond, and recover from hazards and emergencies the town may encounter based on the 2015 plan and previous hazards documented over the years.

The purpose of the plan is to show the state that the town is working to identify possible hazards, and preventing them to the best of their ability. In the event of an emergency, the town can apply for financial assistance to recover from the

impacts. Without the plan in place, the town wouldn't be able to get funding.

The top five hazards recognized in 2022 that are most likely to happen are: flooding, winter storms, thunderstorms, high winds, and extreme temperatures. The state requires the town focus on and prepare for these hazards, but does not limit the town to them.

Hazards such as floods are organized in a table, and are mitigated by keeping culverts in good shape and up to date. Residents and board members discussed the sediment running into Amherst Lake as well as the Emerald Ash Borer invasive species as town hazardous concerns.

The board agreed to send the plan to the Vermont Emergency Management to be reviewed by the state for final approval and adoption. The full Local Hazard Mitigation Plan will be posted at a later date upon finalization.

The board then transitioned to a request from the town's attorney, Bill Meub, to delay the tax sales on the Hawk properties. Though the town voted in their last meeting to move ahead with the tax sales, both Meub and the town's tax sale attorney, Steve Ankuda, advised postponing for now.

Meub represents Hawk Resort International, LLC in the upcoming sale of their properties, and stated that they have a contract with "a very good purchaser" to sell what is known as Valley Four, and are expecting to close before July 1. From the proceeds of the sale, HRI intends to pay all of their taxes owed. Meub noted the remaining lots on the hillside are not currently being sold, but HRI does intend to sell those in the next five to six years.

Board member Keith Cappellini asked about the remaining lots, and if they are not being sold, "who is going to own them and who is going to continue to pay taxes?" Meub explained the hillside lots would still be

owned by HRI, who will continue to pay taxes on those properties until they are able to sell them off. He claimed, "I believe we have the ability to pay, and I don't think we have to prove our ability to pay moving forward... just as anyone else shouldn't have to prove that they have the ability to pay [their future taxes]."

Meub also explained he would provide an agreement between HRI and the town ensuring that, out of the proceeds of the closing, the town will be paid entirely on the taxes currently owed. Meub suggested that Ankuda assist in the verbiage of the final agreement. Kullman requested legal advice from Ankuda, to which the meeting was brought into executive session.

Upon return, Kullman reported that Ankuda "felt that it was in the town's best interest that the board appoint somebody to negotiate on behalf of the town and consult with him," to make a final agreement with HRI. The board nominated Cappellini, and made the motion to delay the tax sale.

Meub commented, "When it closes, you will be very happy with what we think is happening with this property and what the potential is... It will really be beneficial for the Town of Plymouth."

Board member Rick Kaminski then reported that they do not have any solid bids as planned for the town building renovation project. Out of seven potential bidders, they are down to one sole bidder, VMS Construction out of Rutland. Kaminski wanted to ensure they didn't receive an inflated bid due to the contractor being the only bidder. Upon reaching out, they agreed to work together with an "open-book process." Kaminski said the contractor "agreed to negotiate with us, show us all of the subcontract bids, vendor bids, material packages,

## Big turnout at Ludlow fishing derby

LUDLOW, Vt. – "Start your engines." With the sun shining and 40 young anglers and their families standing at the edge of Cook Pond in Ludlow, Steven Howard, President of the Black River Rod and Gun Club, hollered to the crowd over the tips of their fishing rods. "Ready!" he cried. "Set! Go!"

On Saturday, May 14, the BRRGC held their annual fishing derby by their headquarters in eastern Ludlow. Tables, loaded with homemade doughnuts and coffee, chips and hotdogs, and charts bearing the names of the young fishermen, stretched out by the forest's fringe, while families readied to begin casting. Locals and nonresidents alike partook in the festivity, as parents hooked bait and helped their young ones reel in trout that had been stocked in the pond in anticipation of the derby. Some 200 trout had been introduced to Cook Pond to prepare for the event, and between the hours of 9 and 10:30 a.m., Howard was constantly busy as kids

between the ages of 3 and 16 lined up to have their fish weighed. "6.2 ounces!" Howard would cry to his wife, Maria, who was jotting down the catches. "8.7! That one's bigger than you!"

The club holds the fishing derby every year. According to Don Lagro, one of the BRRGC's directors, it started in the early 1950s and was originally held at Jewel Brook. The club shifted to Cook Pond years later and have stayed active by hosting events like the Fishing Derby and their annual Field Day, which takes place every August. "We're all volunteer based," said Lagro, as beside him Howard dropped another trout on the scale. "It's the

volunteers that can allow us to do this."

Children were awarded prizes for first fish and largest fish caught. A limit of five fish was placed on every angler, and most fishermen caught their five, with a total of 103 fish caught between the participants. From four-year-olds, hardly able to lift a rod, to sixteen-year-olds, who came by themselves to try their luck, the air was full of the whoops and hollers of success throughout the morning. "We try to make it as fun as possible for the kids," said Howard as a young girl ran up to him, a fish wiggling in her hands. "We want them to fish."

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
# Celebration at Cold Spring Park

WESTON, Vt. – On Sunday, May 29, there will be a reception at 4 p.m. to celebrate the completion of the reconstruction of Weston's Cold Spring Brook Memorial Park.

The Park was devastated by Tropical Storm Irene, which, in its lower section, unleashed an erosive torrent carving a channel of little stability.

After years of planning, permitting, funding, and execution, the restoration is now complete. That work was directed and overseen by the Weston Conservation Commission and the Weston Community Association. The stream channel has been re-established and the whole area has been landscaped.

The final steps were the planting of 825 daffodil bulbs last fall by the Green Mountain Gardeners, and

Municipal Manager Scott Murphy confirmed that the town's insurance was sufficient to cover the track. He also said that the project would not need Act 250 permitting but would require a DRB hearing and approval. A newly formed group, called LAST (Ludlow Area Sports Trails), which will operate under the Vermont Mountain Bike Association, would help fund the maintenance costs through fees and provide the manpower for maintenance. Anticipated maintenance costs to the town are estimated at approximately \$1,500 per year.

The next Ludlow Select-board meeting is scheduled for Monday, June 6 at the Ludlow Town Hall and via Zoom.

complete estimate, lay it all out for us?"

VMS does plan to subcontract out certain parts for the project, like the panel system installation, which they didn't have any solid estimates for to date, and they are also waiting on estimates from the vendor for the structural steel for the main frames. These numbers would affect an overall bid they would feel comfortable standing behind, which they hope to have within seven to ten days.

Kaminski recommended the board wait that time and allow for a bid to come through. He said, "I'm comfortable with this contractor to be upfront and straightforward with us, and show us all their numbers."

The next selectboard meeting is scheduled for Monday, June 6 at 6 p.m.

## Chester fishing derby

CHESTER, Vt. – This past Saturday, May 15, was the Chester Fishing Derby at Chester Reservoir. It was a warm morning, with bright sun. George Wilson was there from the Chester Rod & Gun Club, registering kids for the derby. At 9 a.m., the derby opened.

As usual, Danny Clemens and I went. Danny sat with George and watched the kids report their catch. I wandered back and forth across the dam and along the road, talking to kids and their parents.

Excitement was in the air. It was shortly after 9 a.m. when Jacob Studin caught the first fish, a six-inch bass. Speaking of bass, there were two large bass, slowly cruising offshore. They were 15 to 17 inches long.

Right now, the bottom of the reservoir is covered with leaves from last fall. There were a few bare spots where a female bass, using her tail, had swept a small area clear of leaves down to the gravel. She does this so she can lay her eggs in gravel. I pointed this out to a couple people there. They found it interesting.

I've been covering this event for a number of years now. Six years ago, I met three-year-old Addison. I've seen her each year since. She has grown into a fine fisherman. This year, Addison brought her friend Emma.

**The catch**  
There were 48 kids registered to fish. Over 90 fish were caught. This was the best derby in recent years.

Most of the trout measured 9 to 11 inches. However, three trout measuring 12 inches were reported. George carefully measured each fish and recorded it. This was a little difficult as the fish were flopping around on the measur-

ing table. The question for George was how to award the largest fish category, a single prize, to more than one winner.

George solved the dilemma this way: Mathew Studin caught one 12-inch trout; Caleb Spittle caught two 12-inch trout. George awarded Caleb the prize.

As I walked around, I talked with kids and parents. I asked one young girl if she was having trout for supper. Her mom said she didn't know how to cook them. I told her how to clean them, and how I cook them, lightly coated with flour in a hot skillet with a little butter, not olive oil.

It was encouraging to see new faces this year. I hesitated to interfere or make suggestions, but I noticed one boy needing help. He didn't have a good technique. So I said to dad, "I don't like to butt in, but I can show him a better way." Dad said, "Please do, I don't know how to fish."

Another boy was catching trout and releasing them. I cringed when I saw the boy handle a trout with his dry hands. Again, I was hesitant, but I felt I had to say something.

I showed him and his dad how to wet your hands before handling a trout, that is, if you plan on releasing the trout. I explained that trout are covered with a thin mucus-type film. This film protects the trout from disease. Handling a trout with dry hands removes the film from the trout, exposing his sensitive skin to disease. If you wet your

hands first, none of the film will stick to your hands. His dad appreciated what I told him.

I'm hesitant because I don't want to appear as a know-it-all, or as interfering.

Fishermen have always been superstitious. Another kid wasn't having much luck. I told him something an old man told me when I was a boy, which was, "Spit on the bait for good luck." He did, but I don't know what effect it might have had.

George had a steady line of kids waiting to have their fish measured. Kids patiently waited their turn. George had a can of bug dope on his table for people to use. It's a good thing, mosquitoes were abundant.

When I left, I went to say goodbye to Addison and Emma. Emma gave me a big hug.

The next meeting of Chester Historical Society is Thursday, May 26 at the Academy Building on Main Street, at 7 p.m. The monthly slideshow will be photos from the estate of Lucile Carlton. Most photos date to the 1920s and were taken near and around the Carlton house on Goldthwaite Road. Included will be a couple views of the Carlton soapstone quarry off Reservoir Road.





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# How can I gauge my investment risk tolerance?

**REGION** – Risk tolerance is an investment term that refers to your ability to endure market volatility. All investments come with some level of risk, and, if you're planning to invest your money, it's important to be aware of how much volatility you can endure. Your tolerance for risk affects your choice of investments and the overall makeup of your portfolio.

If you are attempting to gauge your own tolerance for risk, consider the following factors:

- **Personality:** Are you able to sleep at night knowing that you've put a portion of your hard-earned dollars at risk in a particular investment? Remember, it might be easy

to tolerate a high-risk investment while it is generating double-digit returns, but consider whether you'll feel the same way if the market takes a downturn with your investment leading the way. It's best to invest at a level of volatility that you are comfortable with.

- **Time Horizon:** The sooner you may need to use your investment dollars, the lower your risk tolerance. For example, for money you plan to use to make a down payment on a house in two years, your risk tolerance is lower than if you're investing for retirement in 20 years. If you can keep your money invested for a long period of time, you may be able to

ride out any downturns in the market (although time alone is no guarantee of higher returns).

- **Capacity For Risk:** How much can you afford to lose? Your capacity for risk depends on your financial position (i.e., your assets, income, and expenses). In general, the more resources or assets you have to fall back on, the higher your risk tolerance.

Many risk tolerance tests are widely available on the internet and in books about investing. Most require that you answer a series of questions and generate a score based on your answers. The score translates into a measure of your risk tolerance and may be matched with the

types of investments that the author deems appropriate for someone with your risk profile. Although these tests may be helpful as a reference, your financial plan should be tailored to your unique circumstances. Don't hesitate to get expert help if you need it.
