Justin Beebe Memorial Service

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. - A memorial Service was held recently for fallen firefighter Justin Beebe at Bellows Falls Union High School.

Beebe, who was 26 years old, died Aug. 13 fighting a wildfire in Nevada.

He was a member of the Lolo Hotshots, an elite U.S. Forest Service team based in Missoula, Montana.

Family, friends and people who did not even know Beebe came to pay their respects to a polite, respectful and hardworking young man.

With thousands in attendance, and the auditorium overflowing to the gymnasium, bagpipes started playing as the fire departments marched in and stood on the right hand side of the stage and the Vermont State Police and Fish and Wildlife officers sat on the left hand side of the stage.

Larry Slason, one of Beebe's coaches, gave the welcome, saying he had never had such a hardworking and talented player as Beebe on his team.

Lolo Hotshots Assistant Superintendant Shawn Faiella spoke of Beebe's interview process and how Beebe had sparkle, drive and heart. He said Beebe had a lot to offer and so was offered the job on Feb. 16.

Faiella spoke of the training missions and how Beebe finally passed him going up a trail.

"He was my brother, family."

Faiella spoke of arriving in town and going to Dari Joy to hang out, which brought a chuckle from the

Father Richie led the crowd in the Lord's Prayer, saying it was "a blessing to all of us to know Justin."

A wildland fire slideshow showed the Hotshots in the woods on July 4 celebrating and singing "The Star Spangled Banner." The slide show gave glimpses into the world of the

Then there was a moment of silence, followed by Coach Bob Lockerby speaking.

He said that Beebe was a true friend to him and to his family. His ability, motivation, and attitude made him a true athlete.

He said Beebe's teammates and classmates wondered why Beebe never got yelled at.

"It was because of his attitude, his effort; he would always find a way to win," the coach said, crying. "He was always running full throttle. It's all right to cry. I am."

Most in the room were also crying. Matt Tomberg told of their fun times at deer camp with Beebe. He mentioned the time when they were sleeping in a small room and it filled up with smoke.

Beebe said it was nothing and to go

"I was proud of him", said Faiella. there was something wrong and kept getting the same answer.

Finally, Tomberg got up and went to the living room, where the wood stove was glowing orange and sending smoke into the room.

They had forgotten to open the damper, which brought a chuckle from many of the more than 2,000 people in attendance.

Jennifer Zaso, Beebe's fiancé, said he had a motto.

"Always be ready for new adventures. Get outside, and love yourself." Mildred Barry, Beebe's aunt, gave

"When you go out into the world, make this a better world," Beebe's mother, Betsy, said. "We are not perfect. Stop sweating the small stuff; open your hearts."

Beebe's sister, Jessica, read the closing poem, "Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening" by Robert Frost.

"Justin was comfortable with who he was," Slason said. "He listened and honored others. Don't back off!"

As the memorial came to a close, music was played to a memorial slideshow of Beebe and his family from the time he was a small baby to his final days as a Hotshot and hometown hero.

A hero he was and always will be, many there said.

Chester hosts Open Meeting Law training session ————

CHESTER, Vt. - Officials from nearby towns gathered at the Chester Town Hall recently to hear attorney Garrett Baxter of the Vermont League of Cities and Towns talk about changes in the State Open Meeting Law from Act 129 and review the law's basic requirements.

According to the Vermont League of Cities and Towns, "Vermont's Constitution requires that all government officers are accountable to the public, and the state's Open Meeting Law implements this requirement."

body of a municipality, and becomes active whenever members of those bodies hold meetings, as defined in 1 V.S.A. § 310(2).

Under the Open Meeting Law, public bodies must: publicly notice meetings, produce and post an agenda, allow for public comment and take minutes at the meeting, and, lastly, ensure the meeting is open to the public.

Chester Town Manager David Pisha, seeking an explanation on the extent to which public comment is enumerated in the law, asked Baxter to explain.

"So during public comment the public cannot just stand up and say

BY JENNIFER JONES The law applies to every public whatever happens to be on their mind that night?" Pisha said. "Does the comment have to pertain to that night's agenda?"

In his reply, Baxter made it clear that the law limits public comment to matters considered by the public body during the meeting; however he cautioned against adhering strictly to the law.

"So while the Selectboard could limit public comment to only those items that are listed on the agenda, in my opinion, that's probably not too politically viable of an option," Baxter said.

effective May 24, 2016, provide clarification on some issues, such as the timeline for posting minutes (five calendar days from the date of the meeting); electronic par-

ticipation at meetings; and response time for a public body that receives a written notice of an alleged violation, which was extended from seven to 10 days.

Further defined are the conditions that require ratifying or declaring void any action taken at or resulting from particular violations, including: a meeting that was not properly noticed, a meeting that a person or the public was wrongfully excluded from attending, or an executive session or portion thereof not authorized by the law.

"The Vermont Supreme Court makes it clear that the laws will be construed liberally in favor of openness

He said as humans we live on a planet that is 75 percent water. Animals with gills can thrive in this habitat, but most mammals had better stay on land, including humans.

Water provides us with nutrients and a source of recreation, but it poses two problems: prolonged swimming in cool waters will lower body temperature, and everyone needs to breathe.

Richardson said that in a panic, water can become a lethal weapon. We can only breathe if our head is above water. Luckily, most people have enough air in their lungs to create a buoyant effect that will keep them above water, at least enough to breathe, if not swim to shore. Kicking can be your asset, propelling you to safety and keeping your head above water.

In the event that you are out on the water in a boat and the boat tips, do not panic. The boat will likely push away from you, but if it's floating, it's a perfect object to hold onto to breathe and eventually swim back to shore.

If you are in the position to save or rescue someone who is drowning, do not become the next victim. Getting in the water is a last resort. Row a boat over to help the victim and give them a rest, throw something that floats to them and secure the other end of the rope, pull them to shore once they've grabbed onto some floating device, and if all else fails, go in yourself. Bring a tool to help both of you, and let them relieve their panic and breathe before trying to help them back to shore.

Larissa Kazema and Gracie VanAkin volunteered with Richardson for roleplay of a possible incident on the water. While on an afternoon canoeing trip, they got distracted and the boat tipped over, sending both into

Larissa and Gracie both remained calm as they kicked their feet, breathed deeply, righted the boat, and began to push the boat to shore.

Strong swimming skills are essential for spending recreational time on water, and it's important to have a plan of action in case something goes wrong, Richardson said.

"What will you do?" He said. "How will you breathe? Who are you with? Fear and panic are your worst enemies, and be wary of exhaustion. Row, throw, tow, and then go out into the water. Don't become the next vic-









Phoenix Books educates on Syrian refugees

RUTLAND, Vt. - Will Notte is using his role as senior bookseller at Phoenix Books to educate residents about Syria and its people, following the mayor's controversial proposal to let up to 100 Syrian refugees settle in the city.

Notte, who also serves as the president of Rutland's Board of Aldermen and is strongly supportive of Mayor Chris Louras' proposal, has set up a book display at the front of the store to provide residents with information about Syria and the plight of its citizens fleeing the Islamic State.

"People have been very excited about the books, and we've sold a good amount," said Notte, who started at Phoenix Rutland when it opened last fall and also works as a freelance editor. "Some people come in specifically because they are looking for information about Syria, while other people come in looking for something else and see the display and are drawn

Books on display include: "Burning Country: Syrians in Revolution and War" by Robin Yassin-Kassab and Leila Al-Shami (The University of Chicago Press); "Soup for Syria" by Barbara Abdeni Massaad (Interlink); "I'm New Here," a children's book about the experience of young refugees, by Anne Sibley O'Brien (Charlesbridge); and "The Morning They Came for Us: Dispatches From Syria" by Janine di Giovanni (Liveright), which has been the display's best-selling book to date, according to Notte.

Some of the books were recommended by Robert Ford, the former U.S. Ambassador to Syria, to a reporter from the "Rutland Herald," who then shared these titles with the bookstore, said Notte. Children's books were included in the display refugees' arrival," Notte added. "Rutland does not have a lot of diversity, so these kinds of books can really prepare them to welcome new classmates who don't look or sound like them."

Rutland's plan to welcome Syrian refugees took root early last year when the mayor learned that the Vermont Refugee Resettlement Program was looking for towns, aside from Burlington, that were willing to host Syrian refugees. Mayor Louras consulted with local stakeholders to determine whether Rutland, which has suffered from slow economic growth and a declining population, would have the capacity, in terms of housing and jobs, to take in 100 refugees. Notte, who is in his ninth year on the Board of Aldermen and his second as President, said he was one of the people Louras consulted and the only member of the board.

When the plan to accept the refugees was announced this April, its opponents, who have coalesced into the 'Rutland First" movement, expressed anger for what they saw as the mayor taking action behind closed doors. The group also cited potential dangers the refugees' arrival could bring, from terrorism and disease to the cost to the city's welfare and educational systems. Rutland First sent a letter to the State Department in opposition to the plan and gathered about 500 signatures on a petition requesting a vote by the Board of Aldermen to put the issue on the ballot.

When the vote to put the measure on the ballot failed, one alderman suggested that, as a compromise, the board could send its own letter to the State Department. The letter, sent in July and signed by seven of the 11 aldermen, stated that the undersigned "[did] not feel that they were current-

"as a way to prep younger kids for the a letter of support for a proposal to establish a new reception and placement program in Rutland."

Proponents of the refugee resettlement plan have formed the "Rutland Welcomes" movement, which has organized volunteers and set up food and clothing drives. The bookstore serves as a pick-up point for "Rutland Welcomes" lawn signs, stickers, and buttons, which people can take with them for a suggested donation to the

In addition to the bookstore, said Notte, churches, the local theater group, and other volunteers are working to raise money beyond the federal funds the town would receive for accepting the refugees.

"I want Rutland to be on the right side of history in this... A big part of making that happen is information; it's letting people, both through fiction and nonfiction, experience someone else's perspective and, maybe, understand it a little better," said Notte. "That is where the bookstore can play a large role in easing concerns and increasing empathy, and in bringing this about

Phoenix Books, which already had locations in Essex Junction and Burlington, Vermont, opened in Rutland in September of 2015 using a "community-supported enterprise" model through which more than 50 people pre-bought books to help fund the store's start-up costs. The fact that the town is already invested in the store through the pre-buy process has made it a natural place to offer information to the greater community,

Many readers will remember George Farrar of West Chester. George lived on the family farm in Potash. I was George's neighbor in the early 1980s and knew him well. The story below was written by George.

"It was in the fall of 1925 that I, my brother Francis, and my sister Mary, along with five or six others started in first grade together at Simsbury School. Our first teacher was Fern Butterfield of Chester. She had all eight grades in that dear old one room schoolhouse. The first graders could stay out after the morning recess until noon. Miss Butterfield drove a Model T Ford that had a pick-up body on it, and we used to have a picnic in the back of it, and our lunches were long gone before noon.

There were several fami-

lies represented over my eight years at Simsbury. Surnames like these-Adams, Farrar, Day, Pinney, Peterson, Stoddard, Potter, Bykko, Short, Kingsbury, Radiocich, Woodmansee, Sweet, Davis, Butler, Trombley, Maki and Hill.

George Farrar.

Chauncey Adams was the show-off at Simsbury. Every now and then the teachers would give him a strapping out. He (Chauncey) would shimmy up trees and swing back and forth. One day he came downtop of the tree and all, and almost landed in the spring (water.) Another time he got stuck in the ski jump and landed flat on his belly. How he hollered! The noise he made, you would think he was half killed. He landed pretty hard and the wind was knocked out

There was one of the girls at Simsbury who had tantrums quite often. Myra Davis was her name, and Mrs. Warren, the teacher used to take her out in the hall and give her a good tanning (spanking.)

One time when working on a bridge construction job in Andover in 1930, there was a character from Weston, and they called him "Lightening." One day after the fourth of July, the time keeper, Everal Wilson, gave Lightening a loaded cigarette. When he got it pretty near smoked up, it blew up with a bang. Scared the Devil out of Lightening, and how he did swear, a whole line of profanity. The fellow's real name was Farell. There were two bridges on that job. One below the Ox-Bow and the other down below the Charles Bentley place, now known as Horse Shoe Acres. The common laborers on that job got forty cents per hour. Once a week a Finnish Baker came up through selling bread, pies etc. The fellows on the bridge job would buy quite a lot from him. He was from Newport, New Hampshire. In those days, a pie was twenty cents. Matt Davison and John Edwards also worked on that job.

During the Prohibition days, two people who lived here in West Chester, were both in the Moonshine business. One, Vernon Bugbee who lived on the then Kalle (Charles) Maki place, or as others knew it,

Vermont moose hunting slows-

This year Vermont is issuing only 160 moose hunting permits.

That's down 40 percent from last year, when the state says there were more moose wandering around.

The moose herd in the Green Mountain State has dwindled to about 2,200

For sportsmen who went to the lottery for the hunting permits, they had only a 1-in-50 chance of getting one.

The problem is warmer winters that allow the tick population to soar, which in turn means a higher moose mortality rate.

It's worse in New Hampshire, where only 71 moose hunting permits were

issued this year. Vermont handed out 265 moose licenses in 2015, and 109 moose were killed

by those hunters. The other issue here is that Vermont's moose hunting had become a travel destination for sport tourism, boosting the state's economy.

Looks like Maine will take up the slack, though. Maine has about 70,000 moose, more than any other state.

Maine also gave out 2,140 moose hunting permits this year.

In Vermont, biologists wanted to reduce the moose population to stabilize it, so the state issued 1,251 permits in 2007 and 2008.

The goal was to pare the herd down to about 3,000 moose. But tick-related deaths of moose calves were higher than anticipated.


Hence, the reduced permit allotment this year.

Cutting the number of permits for hunting moose also means more moose for people to see, which is a tourist attraction. That's also the idea in Maine, where a plan to cut moose permits by 24 percent next year has been sug-

Vermont wildlife biologists say that keeping the moose herd smaller will ensure that the remaining moose are healthier.

We hope that's a workable solution. This season, Oct. 15 to 20, will tell. If it doesn't work, then other measures are clearly called for, and it may take the state legislature to implement them.

Op-Ed: Mega-wind power project to affect largest number of homes in state

The 28-turbine Stiles Brook Wind Project proposed by Spanish company Iberdrola Renewables, were it to go forward, would not only be the largest in the state but also the most intrusive.

Lynn Barrett, spokesperson for the Grafton Woodlands Group, told Watchdog that there are 94 homes in Windham and nine in Grafton between a half and one mile of at least one of the proposed 500-foot turbines. She added that over 50 percent of Windham's homes, or 235 homes, would be within 1.5 miles. In Grafton, 22 dwellings would be within 1.25 miles.

Graphs that Barrett provided to Watchdog seem to indicate that's roughly four or five times the number of homes with a similar range at existing mega-turbine projects in Sheffield and Lowell.

In extreme cases, as in Sheffield, families within one mile of a turbine project have had to leave their homes due to extensive noise and vibration disturbances.

On Election Day, legal residents of Windham will hold a nonbinding vote on whether to accept or reject the Stiles Brook Wind Project. Iberdrola leaders say they will

ger told Watchdog. "We are there because of the natural beauty and the aesthetics ... and certainly the noise, if we find it bothersome, we would leave. We would probably leave at a huge loss."

She said she also is concerned about the watershed.

"We are here on the Saxtons River, which is historically an extremely flood-prone river as is," she said. "We were completely washed out in (Tropical Storm) Irene; our town had \$5 million worth of damage."

She said she has experienced several other major floods in Grafton over the years, so she's wary of how a new major construction might make flooding worse.

"Building this facility on top of the headwaters of the Saxtons River to us appears very dangerous. Creating those kinds of impervious surfaces that will then prevent the kind of natural sponging effect that the forest otherwise would have."

Like Ruegger, Kissel also frets over the value of her property.

"We are very worried about prop-

has happened in so many places," she said. "Property values will decline and many properties will become unsaleable. Who wants to buy a house under a power plant?"

Regarding the controversial project's impact on the upcoming gubernatorial election, both Kissel and Ruegger said that the issue is pushing voters towards Republican Phil Scott, who is calling for a moratorium on wind power projects in Vermont. Democrat Sue Minter has come out strongly for Big Wind and opposes letting towns have veto power over controversial renewable energy projects.

"This is locally the biggest issue that we care about," Kissel said. "This is so important that a lot of people have already said they will vote differently than they would have previously voted, choosing their representative from another party they might not have otherwise voted for."

Ruegger echoed that sentiment.

'My understanding is that Minter is very much pro-alternative energy, consequences be damned," he said. "I've been told that Scott is for a moratorium on ridgeline wind, so it's pretty clear if you are concerned about ridgeline wind who your candidate should be."





Hotshot and hometown hero, Justin Beebe, brought home to rest

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. - People lined the sidewalks on both sides of the street around the Bellows Falls Fire Department to welcome home their fallen hero, Justin Beebe.

Waiting since 9 p.m., it was 12: 35 a.m. when the public safety brigade escorting Beebe arrived in town.

Vermont State Police, Windham Sheriff's Department, Bellows Falls Police Department.


The dark night came to a close. The apparatus went back. The community went home, but not to forget their hero.



LUDLOW, Vt. - The biographic film about Physicist Stephen Hawkings, "The Theory of Everything," will be FOLA's (Friends of Ludlow Auditorium) next movie on Saturday, Sept. 3 at 7 p.m. in the Ludlow Town Hall Auditorium.

The Theory of Everything is a 2014 British biographical romantic drama film directed by James Marsh and adapted by Anthony McCarten from the memoir Travelling to Infinity: My Life with Stephen by Jane Wilde Hawking, which deals with her relationship with her ex-husband, theoretical physicist Stephen Hawking, his diagnosis of motor neurone disease, and his success in physics.

Stephen's father she intends to stay with Stephen even as his condition worsens. They marry and have a son.

Stephen presents his thesis to the examination board, arguing that a black hole created the universe; they tell him his theory is brilliant. While celebrating with Jane and his friends, Stephen realizes he cannot walk and begins using a wheelchair.

Stephen develops a theory about the visibility of black holes and becomes a world-renowned physicist.







Now is the time to spot shorebirds in Vermont —

ADDISON, Vt. - The final weeks of August and beginning of September mark a unique birding opportunity in Vermont. Shorebirds, such as plovers and sandpipers, are migrating through the state on their southern journey from northern Canada to the Caribbean and beyond.

One of the best places to spot shorebirds this time of year is at Dead Creek Wildlife Management Area in Addison. The Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department lowers water levels on

Dead Creek in late summer to provide habitat for migrating shorebirds and other species. Bird-watchers have also reported spotting shorebirds around Sandbar Wildlife Management Area in Milton, Vermont this

"The lack of rainfall has led to low water levels this year providing ample habitat for shorebirds, particularly along Lake Champlain," said John Buck,

migratory bird biologist for the Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department. "I'd encourage people to grab their binoculars and camera and take advantage of this brief and exciting birding opportunity."


