

Santa Express rides in to the North Pole

CHESTER/BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. Families gathered at the Bellows Falls Green Mountain Railroad train station on Sunday to ride the Santa Express to the North Pole, which is also known as the Chester train sta-

with a big smile on her face. Much fun was to be had at the North Pole, until the train was ready for departure and everyone boarded again to return to Bellows Falls.

"Palomita" documents

Q'ewar dolls

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. - A radiant old woman in traditional Peruvian Quechan dress and a doll fill the poster for "Palomita."

Teresa Saval's movie, "Palomita," that documents how dolls change lives, plays at the Bellows Falls Opera House at 6:15 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 1.

Hand-sewn dolls like Palomita (little dove in Spanish), the doll won in a raffle by Gwen, a 6th grade student at Kurn Hattin, improve life for families in Andahuaylillas, Peru.

At 12,000 feet, Andahuaylillas, outside of Cuzco in the Andes mountains, is big on grandeur due to the peaks and a famous church, but short on economic opportunities. Lucy Terrazas grew up in the region. She and her partner Julio Herrera moved back. Herrera came with experience in making wooden puppets and teaching at a Waldorf School in

The idea of making dolls had turned in his head for awhile. Terrazas and Herrera hired some women to help them fill a mattress with wool.

with the ex-How to keep four needy women employed?

The wool became the stuffing for dolls designed in a Waldorf inspired style by Herrera. The women

embarked on artistic careers hand sewing dolls. Wool from sheep is washed and carded to use for stuffing or spun into thread. Weavers on traditional looms create cloth. Doll hair is spun alpaca wool.

Herrera says use of all-natural materials gives texture, and the soft shape of the dolls allows for a child to imagine and to feel more than plastic allows.

The workshop grew as the doll market grew from the plaza by the church to Australia, Europe, Canada, and the USA. Terrazas, in a video about the Qewar project on www.

Susan Sebastian Foundation purchases art for VT hospitals

SPRINGFIELD, Vt. - Patient hospital rooms throughout Vermont will be more pleasant now with a gift from the Sebastian Foundation used to purchase art to brighten the

Springfield hospital, the last hospital in Vermont to receive the gift, received a check for \$18,820 to purchase 38 pieces of art created by several local artists.

The art was purchased through the Gallery at the Vault, located in downtown Springfield.

The check was passed at a ceremony held at Springfield Hospital Library last week. Attorney Gilbert Myers, now retired, presented the check to Vault Board Chairman John Hughes and Vault Director Marilyn Miller.

Myers had established the foundation for client Susan Sebastian, whose goal was to put artwork in all Vermont hospitals. Sebastian passed away before her goal had been reached, and Myers, through the foundation, fulfilled her wishes. uestions remain after new manager's hire

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. - Interim Municipal Manager Shane O'Keefe conducted his first Rockingham Town Selectboard meeting recently.

He had to contend with the public dissatisfaction over the mutual agreement that ended former municipal manage Chip Stearns' tenure, questioned the process of O'Keefe's

Villager Doug MacPhee noted that he left the previous meeting very disturbed with the process of the previous manager's separation from the municipality.

"It is my understanding that the Bellows Falls (Village) Trustees had no prior knowledge that the (joint)

as several members of the public executive session held Nov. 3, 2016 was not to evaluate Mr. Stearns, but to dismiss him," MacPhee said. "That during the session, you, Mr. Chairman, (Lamont Barnett), threatened the Bellows Falls Trustees by stating that if they did not support your actions you would change the locks on the town hall and not allow Mr. Stearns access to his office.

"Prior to the Nov. 3 meeting, at least

one person had been contacted to fill the position as an interim manager," MacPhee continued. "That until (they) entered the second executive session on Nov. 8, the Bellows Falls Trustees had no prior knowledge of the hiring of Mr. O'Keefe as the interim manager and therefore did not have the necessary information about Mr. O'Keefe's work history."

McPhee also had questions about

how much Stearns was paid as severance.

"What was the gross amount paid

to Mr. Stearns for his forced resignation? Do any other selectmen care to answer my questions?" he said. "I have not spoken to any selectman, trustees or Mr. Stearns since the Nov.

The charges MacPhee made were largely unconfirmed by the board, except Barnett disclosed that Stearns was paid six months salary, plus earned compensation and vacation time, when he left.

Villager Deborah Wright said that O'Keefe's hiring was brought up as already done, and there were no other options in the board's second executive session on the issue, which

she said was not done properly. Wright asked that the board ratify the vote, but was told that couldn't be done unless there was a joint board meeting. Wright noted that the Vermont League of Cities and Towns has policies that cover how a board should handle an employee, covering documentation, reprimand, and conversations to repair and fix problems, and "none of those have been

done by the board." However, there is a clause in the mutual agreement that each party agrees that with respect to all matters set forth and covered by this agreement, they shall not disparage or make negative statements about the other parties. For purposes of this section the term "disparage" means any comments or statements that would adversely affect in any manner the conduct of a party's employment or the business or personal reputation of any party.

Stearns left after the two boards commissioned a report on how he disposed of the debris from a covered bridge destroyed by Tropical Storm Irene in 2011 and held executive sessions on the issue. The remains were owned by the Vermont League of Cities and Towns, but some residents and officials felt Stearns should have notified them of what he was doing.

On a different note, Selectboard member Josh Hearne announced that he's done.

"Effective this evening, I am resigning from the Rockingham Selectboard," he said.

Hearne said that the reason for his resignation is that he is moving to Grafton, and will no longer be a resident of Rockingham. Hearne thanked the public for vot-

ing for him and stated that he has enjoyed his tenure on the board. Hearne received a round of ap-

plause and the board thanked Hearne for his years of service. The Town of Rockingham is now taking applications to fill Hearne's seat until the town election in March 2017. Hearne requested his last act on

the board be to adjourn the meeting, which he did at 8:10 p.m.



Deer Hunting Memories —

It's that time of year when I look back on the days my father, my older brother Brian and I went deer hunting together. I was eight years old before I could join my father and Brian deer hunting.

My father began instructing me with guns when I was five years old. He always stressed safety. I remember my father telling me over and over, year after year, "It doesn't matter how big the finger is on the trigger. Once you pull the trigger, you can't put the bullet back in the cartridge. Make sure of your target before you fire and keep the muzzle down."

Hunting with my father and brother was exciting. We'd get up at four in the morning and have a big breakfast while the rest of the family slept. I remember bacon and eggs, toast and oatmeal. We always made fried egg sandwiches to take with us for lunch. My mother baked chocolate chip cookies the night before to take with us. My father always made a Thermos of coffee.

We'd sit around the kitchen table

in our long johns, eating breakfast and planning the day. I was so excited that I slept little the night before.

We hunted a lot in Mount Holly. We'd get out of the Scout before the sun was up and quietly close the doors instead of slamming them shut so as not to announce our presence. We each had a pre-selected stand cleared out of leaves and twigs so we could move around a little. I saw many mornings 10 degrees above zero or colder. No matter how warm you were dressed or how warm your 70 pounds. When rifle season came boots were, sitting for hours, the cold would set in. It was nice to be able to get up and move around a little without making any noise. A handwarmer was your best friend.

At noon we would meet back at the Scout to have our lunch and compare notes on what we'd seen. That's when my father would open the Thermos. I didn't like coffee but I happily drank some, as I was now one of the men.

My brother was very excitable and how he would curse. He'd seen a doe being followed by what he knew was a buck but never saw its head to see antlers. Another thing about Brian was he never fired just one shot. He always emptied his gun. My father got a deer every year for over 30 years and only fired but once. He drilled it into my head, "Make the first shot count." I guess Brian didn't


In those days you could only shoot one deer a year, be it archery season or rifle season. One archery season, when I was 14, I shot my first deer with a bow. It was a small deer about

I asked my father if I could have the head mounted. "No", he said, "We can't afford it. You can cut the antlers off and keep them as your trophy." That winter I saw an ad in

I shot him with my great-grandfather's singleshot 20-gauge shotgun using a slug at about 40 feet distant. It hit him so hard that it knocked him over. He never got up.

My classmate in the sixth grade, Kevin Gould, also got his first deer the last day of the season that year. Kevin's was a spike-horn weighing 114 pounds. The Gould family was well known for their hunting abili-



Vermont takes the initiative again

Recently Vermont was on the forefront of yet another national endeavor the White House Police Data Initiative.

The Vermont State Police are the first statewide police agency to join the national database intended to increase transparency of law enforcement.

The first five data sets posted to the database are Vermont State Police figures on traffic stops between 2010 and 2015; traffic fatalities and seatbelt use since 2010; driving while intoxicated arrests since 2013; all drunk driving arrests involving a crash since 2013; and trooper-involved shootings since

The best part is that the data sets are posted online, and can be accessed by anyone with an Internet connection.

The head of the VSP, Col. Matthew Birmingham, said letting the public view data on police work is part of a process toward developing a greater degree of trust and responsiveness between the community and law enforce-

Birmingham said more data sets will be released to the national database, including decisions made by prosecutors and defense attorneys in cases.

The information could help track disparities in how offenses are handled in different parts of the state, he said. The database currently has just Vermont State Police data, but the hope is

other agencies in the state will join and submit their figures. Mark Hughes of the nonprofit group Justice For All in Vermont says the importance of data in police accountability can't be discounted. He said they can't now access raw police data from many of the law enforcement agencies

The next step is to use the data to set strategic goals for the VSP, both as an agency and for various departments within the State Police, Birmingham

With their membership in the White House Police Data Initiative, Vermont State Police are inviting inspection, and we believe that's a good thing.

Only by being open and above-board can law enforcement gain the trust of the public, and the Vermont State Police have taken a significant first step. We commend them for their action, and hope it's a sign other police agencies will follow their lead and join as well.

Five Vermont Cheese makers were honored in San Francisco on Monday when the Good Food Awards announced its 2017 nominees for the Good Food Awards. Along with the Vermont Cheese Council members, six long time artisan food exhibitors who participate in the annual Vermont Cheesemakers Festival were honored as well.

Grafton Village Cheese Company received nominations for two of its artisan, hand-crafted cheeses: Bear Hill, a 100 percent sheep's milk, washed-rind, alpinestyle cheese and "Queen of Quality" Clothbound Cheddar," an internationally-awarded, limitedsupply clothbound cheddar made from grass-fed Jersey cow's milk produced on Farms for City Kids Foundation/ Springbrook Farm in Reading, Vt.

Act 46 Update from TRSU

The Two Rivers Supervisory Union Act 46 committee met on October 25 and November 1 to engage with members of the public, review administrative recommendations for the education of students in grades pre-K through grade 12, and review tax rate projections. The present charge of the Act 46 committee is: "To study the advisability of forming a union school district."

The single school district would create a new governance structure with one school budget, one pre-CLA tax rate, and one school board from Chester to Mount Holly. Additionally, local school districts would no longer own their schools; the larger union school district would own them. The outcome of the committee's work will require a positive vote in each town to create the single school district.

In May the committee tasked the administrative team with determining a model that would not only provide more opportunities for our students, but would also save enough money to make the impact on the pre-CLA tax rate neutral or

better for each town. The Superintendent, Meg Alison Powden, presented their recommendation on September 20.

The team recommends maintaining all elementary schools and making them Pre-K - 5, or K - 5, depending on how those communities handle pre- K now. Then, having a regional middle school for all towns and grades 6 - 8 at the location of the current Black River Union Middle School/High School. Finally, a regional high school for students of all towns and grades 9 - 12 would attend at Green Mountain Union High School. Hopefully a specific program for dual enrollment and/ or a Castleton component in the future housed in Ludlow. The specific savings for the entire model will be reviewed at a later meeting of the committee. The committee is also taking input on alternative ideas.

At the meeting held on November 1 in Ludlow, we heard from many residents with comments ranging from positive to negative. We appreciated the feedback as well as the thoughtful ideas and suggestions. We welcome questions and comments from members of all of our communities and encourage you to participate.

"Cooking is the number one cause of home fires," said Lloyd Ziel, Chief Communications and Marketing Officer for the American Red Cross in New Hampshire and Vermont. "Thousands of people will travel over the holiday. We want people to stay safe and offer steps they can take to avoid a kitchen fire and reach their destination

Cooking safety tips

· Don't wear loose clothing or leeves that dangle while cooking.

· If you are frying, grilling or broiling food, never leave it unattended - stay in the kitchen. If you just leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.

· If you're simmering, baking, roasting or broiling food, check it regularly.

• Use a timer to remind yourself that the stove or oven is on.

 Keep kids and pets away from the cooking area. Make them stay at least three feet away from the stove.

· Keep anything that can catch fire pot holders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper or plastic bags, food packaging, and towels or curtains-away from your stove, oven or any other appliance in the kitchen that generates heat.

 Clean cooking surfaces on a regular basis to prevent grease buildup.

· Consider purchasing a fire extinguisher to keep in your kitchen. Contact your local fire department to take training on the proper use of extinguishers.

· Always check the kitchen before going to bed or leaving the home to make sure all stoves, ovens, and small appliances are turned off.

· Install a smoke alarm near your kitchen, on each level of your home, near sleeping areas, and inside and outside bedrooms if you sleep with doors closed. Use the test button to check it each month. Replace all batteries at least once a year.

Highway safety

· If driving, check the weather along your route and plan for travel around any storms that may be coming. Watch weather predictions for your entire route so you know what to expect along the way.

· Buckle up, slow down, and don't drive impaired. Give your full attention to the road. Avoid distractions such as cell phones.

• Be well rested and alert.

Follow the rules of the road.

· Use caution in work zones.

· Observe speed limits - driving too fast or too slow can increase your chance of being in a collision. Don't follow another vehicle too closely.

 Make frequent stops. During long trips, rotate drivers. If you're too tired to drive, stop and get some rest.

 Clean your headlights, taillights, signal lights and windows to help you see, especially at night.

· Turn your headlights on as dusk approaches, or if you are using your windshield wipers due to inclement weather. Don't overdrive your head-



Bring holiday cheer to loved ones behind bars

REGION - It's difficult - but not im- and reflecting often brings up feelings possible – for the festive atmosphere associated with the holiday season to penetrate the walls of America's prisons and jails.

"Holidays are supposed to be a time for being with family and friends, along with being a time for reflection," says Christopher Zoukis (www. ChristopherZoukis.com), a prisonreform and inmate-education advocate who is serving time at Federal Correctional Institution Petersburg Medium in Virginia.

But behind those gleaming rows of razor wire, he says, there is no family

of failure. This can be doubly so for prisoners with children. Meanwhile, family members on the outside have their own stress and depression to cope with, and may feel guilt that they aren't doing enough for the inmate.

But be of good cheer. There are several ways family members can help both themselves and the family member behind bars cope for Thanksgiving and the Holiday seasons to come.

• Pay a visit. This not only provides that special, personal interaction, but gives loved ones a chance to hug, hold and simply be with each other during

the holidays when family and being thankful is most important.

• Write a letter. A family member who can't visit can still reach out with a heartfelt letter. "A letter can mean a lot to a prisoner and they'll most certainly re-read it over the next several months," Zoukis says. Any photographs included with the letter likely will make it to the inmate's locker door. If the inmate has children, they might consider writing their own letter or creating a drawing.

· Send money or a care package (when allowed). A check isn't as meaningful as a visit, but inmates can

always use extra money for purchases in the commissary or to put on their phone account. Many prison systems severely limit what they provide for free to indigent prisoners, so even \$25 or \$50 can make a real difference. In some prison system, family members can send care packages, either as a regular activity or sometimes just at the holidays. Check first with the prisoner's counselor.

So spend a little time this Thanksgiving, and the Christmas and New Year holidays as well, thinking about an incarcerated friend or family







Sanders announces annual State of the Union essay contest

REGION - U.S. Sen. Bernie says entered into the Congres-Sanders launched his seventh annual State of the Union essay contest Tuesday, calling on Vermont's high school students to address what they view as the major issues facing the United States.

Last year, nearly 800 students from 39 Vermont high schools wrote essays detailing their own view of the "state of the union." The U.S. Constitution calls

for the president to "give to the Congress information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient." Sanders is again asking Vermont's high school students to consider writing an essay of 250 to 500 words detailing their own view of the state of the union.

The essay contest is an opportunity for Vermont high school students to articulate what issues they would prioritize if they were president. A panel of Vermont teachers will judge the essays and select a winner. The finalists will have their essional Record -- the official archive of the United States Senate and House of Representatives. Sanders will also hold a roundtable discussion with the finalists.

"Our students are the future of our country -- and they must be involved in the discussion about where our country needs to go. This is a great opportunity for students to articulate their views and concerns," said Sanders, who serves on the Senate education committee.

Since Sanders' State of the Union essay contest was first held, roughly 2,400 students from schools throughout Vermont have written essays on topics such as the declining middle class, climate change, health care reform, the rising cost of a college education, and many other issues.

The deadline for student essay submissions is Wednesday. Jan. 11, 2017. More information can be found on the senator's webpage at http://www.sanders. senate.gov/stateoftheunion/ or by calling (800) 339-9834.



Muzzleloader antlerless permits are mailed

mits for Vermont's muzzleloader deer season were mailed to recipients on November 14, according to the Fish & Wildlife Department.

Antlerless deer permits are allocated in 16 of Vermont's 21 Wildlife Management Units (WMUs) for the December 3-11 muzzleloader season, which is expected to result in an estimated 2,700 antlerless deer being taken.

"The number of muzzleloader season antlerless deer permits was increased to account for the expected in-

REGION – Antlerless per- crease in the deer population less permits in order to better following the exceptionally mild winter of 2016," said Nick Fortin, deer project leader for the Fish & Wildlife Department. "The permit allocation is intended to allow moderate population growth in most of the state while stabilizing or reducing deer densities in a few areas."

Hunter success with muzzleloader antlerless permits typically ranges from 10 to 35 percent depending on WMU. WMU-specific success rates are taken into consideration each year when issuing antlermanage the harvest of antlerless deer.

Some unallocated antlerless permits are still available for WMUs A, K and N on Vermont Fish & Wildlife's website www.vtfishandwildlife.com.

Hunters receiving permits as lottery or landowner applicants are also listed on Fish & Wildlife's website.






