Police department discussion

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. - Village of Bellows Falls Police Chief Ron Lake had several issues for the Village Board of Trustees at a recent meeting.

Before his comments, Municipal Manager Shaun O'Keefe congratulated Bellows Falls K-9 Caesar and his handler, Officer Mario Checchi, who have graduated from the Vermont Police Academy's K-9 tracking patrol school.

O'Keefe noted that K-9 Caesar is now certified to track lost and missing individuals, escaped fugitives and locate missing evidence.

"I hope that we never have to use Caesar to locate a missing person, but I am very thankful that we have him if necessary," Lake said.

O'Keefe thanked the community for its support of the program.

Lake stated that Caesar is a very valuable asset. Checchi was chosen as handler of Caesar, a 12-month-old Belgian Malinois

donated to the Bellows Falls Police Department by the Vermont State Police Canine Association, so the department would pursue a canine program.

"Caesar and the officer are one in a million," Lake said.

Adding to concern on village drug abuse, on Dec. 16 a Bellows Falls man was arrested and charged at a traffic stop after police allegedly found him to be in possession of 100 bags of heroin.

Lake then presented a breakdown of police department overtime. The presentation was at the request of the board at an Oct. 18 meeting.

"Scheduled overtime has been occurring since July, when officers expressed a desire for two officers on at all times and I agreed," Lake said then.

Lake also disclosed that a request had come in from the union to make a greater effort to have two officers on duty 24/7.

"From July 24 to Oct. 1, overtime was at \$8,800 and if I had another

Mole Hill Theatre STEAMing into the future

ALSTEAD, N.H. - Mole Hill Theatre renovations have curtailed some winter programming there, as Dennis Molesky retrofits the tool and die shop and theater building to host a new charter high school called LEAF School.

LEAF School opens in September 2017 at Mole Hill Theatre with space for 28 ninth graders.

Students may apply now through March 1, 2017.

The LEAF name embodies the school's mission: Learning from Local Leaders, Experiential Education, Arts Integration and Academic Achievement, Freedom and Flexibility.


The STEM acronym, Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math,

with Art added, turns into STEAM. The www.leafschoolnh.org website has information on admissions, opportunities, curriculum, and how to connect with LEAF School.

Dakota Benedetto says the charter school idea at Mole Hill is solid.

"(It) primarily sprang from work in public schools, for many years continuing to see the same kind of kids fall through the cracks: generally bright and creative ones that don't fit into the traditional public school mold," she said.

In the fall of 2014, Benedetto invited others to work with her on applying to the State of New Hampshire to open a charter school. She has board members Katy Haas, Barb Davis, Lonn Livengood, Sally Eaton, David Benedetto (her brother), Erik Walker, Beth Leineau, Catherine St. Pierre, and Maria Luther-Houghton. "Awesome board; I can't say enough

wonderful things about them," Benedetto said.

Dennis Molesky, key to the venture, advises the board.

Around Christmas 2014 Ben-

nedetto attended an event at Mole Hill Theatre. By then the LEAF School idea was down on paper with a goal of application to the State of New Hampshire for charter school status.

With LEAF School on her mind and inspired by the space, part large tool and die shop and part event venue, she asked Dennis Molesky about how Mole Hill Theatre was used on weekdays.

Would a school fit in? The idea intrigued Molesky.

"I like to see the space utilized," he said. "My parents always believed in public education and this charter

Alliance created to address burglaries

SPRINGFIELD, Vt. - The Springfield Regional Chamber of Commerce is very concerned about the string of break-ins and robberies at businesses in Springfield, so we have been working to figure out ways we can help. A meeting was held on November 30 with the Town Manager, Tom Yennerell, the Chief of Police, Doug Johnston, and some of the area businesses that were victims of crimes. We had a good conversation, sharing concerns, frustrations and ideas, and we came away from that meeting with the beginnings of a plan.

One of the concerns raised was that news of these incidents has been lacking; individuals felt that area businesses should be warned when a robbery or violent act occurs, so that they can be aware of the threat and act accordingly in a timely manner. In terms of keeping people abreast of developments, the police department does have a Facebook page where they post updates, but not everyone local is on Facebook. It was agreed that we need a better system for sharing information. And thus the Springfield Information Sharing Alliance.

We settled on the idea of an email

list as a more convenient method of mass communicating. The idea is that any area business that wants to stay in the loop can add their email address to the list to be notified of significant crime incidents in the community. Involvement is not limited to Chamber members, this Alliance is open to all local businesses and we encourage others to join. Informational emails will be issued from the police department, the Town, or a directly informed source.

The primary purpose of the Springfield Information Sharing Alliance (SISA) email list is to inform area businesses as soon as possible about potential threats, so that they can, to the best of their ability, protect their employees and their establishments. A secondary benefit of this coalition is the potential for community members to assist in the solving of crimes. By updating businesses in the loop, everyone will be on the alert to keep their eyes and ears open for any suspicious activity that might be relevant to the cases. We've all heard the saying "If you See Something, Say Something," and this is a perfect example of a situation where we can all do our part to watch over our neighbors and report

anything that doesn't seem right. Let's not let Springfield be an easy target!

The Chamber encourages local businesses who are concerned about the safety of their establishments to contact the police department and learn more about proper security measures, best practices and ways to help protect your business and our neighborhood. The SISA concept is a work in progress, and we will continue to develop strategies for improving communication between area businesses, our local police department and the town, and looking at ways that we as a community can be part of the solution.

officer the amount would be \$6,228, a \$2,000 difference," Lake said.

Lake continued that he had provided a memo to the board with the information requested concerning overtime hours.

Lake said that the opening for a 10th officer has been posted and is hoped to be filled soon.

Villager Deborah Wright stated that with the current status it would appear that the department would run over budget by \$40,000, and she asked if the hiring of a 10th officer would alleviate some of this overage.

O'Keefe answered that he is hoping it will cut down overtime by having a full-time officer instead of

several part-timers. Lake stated that it would, although the savings may not show as much in this fiscal year as they will in 2018.

O'Keefe distributed a spreadsheet showing the impact of the 10th officer and the shift coverage and overtime prior to the hiring of the officer, and he also presented the budget showing a \$51,781 overage. The remaining unbudgeted items showed a \$38,780 overage, which will result in a \$90,561 total unbudgeted amount.

O'Keefe thanked Finance Assistant Nicky Gay for pulling the numbers together for the meeting.

Lastly, a request was made from the West River Radio Club to the Bellows Falls Village Board of Trustees to consider installing an amateur radio repeater atop a tower at the end of Griswold Drive.

Lake said that he would support this

and recommended that the trustees approve the request, based on the consistent helpfulness of having the ham radio team assist during emergency situations.

The item will be revisited at a future meeting.

school appealed to me. Dad's older brother's paid tuition to Keene High for him to get technical education."

Mike Ballou of Gilsom will continue working at his United Tool and Stamping at Mole Hill. In Spring 2017, Mole Hill Theatre reopens. The school rents space on weekdays during the school year.

Benedetto, with the LEAF School Board of Trustees, secured State of New Hampshire approval and funds for the charter school. New Hampshire funds charter schools at about \$6,500 per pupil. A traditional public school is given a little less from the state, but adds in local tax money for about \$12,000 to \$14,000 per pupil.

Benedetto and the board obtained a one-time federal grant of \$525,000 to cover some of the setup costs over three years. The federal grant helps with buying secure computer systems, furniture, and text books. The grant will not cover vehicles, salaries, or any permanent improvements to Mole Hill Theatre.

If more than 28 New Hampshire students apply, luck of the draw determines who gets in. Tuition is free for New Hampshire residents. Students from outside of New Hampshire will be accepted on a tuition basis if the 28 slots aren't filled by local students.

For students in SAU 60, the Fall Mountain Regional High School area, the district by law must provide transportation.

"A big part of curriculum is bringing in community members to share their skills or about their jobs on a one-time or an on-going basis," Benedetto said. "So many wonderful, interesting people around. Sometimes kids limit themselves, (their) livelihood, but not just that. They

think options in life are limited to what they see around them. They don't realize that there is this wonderful world of opportunity and variety."

Benedetto would like community

members to introduce students to the wide variety of possibilities. Interested residents are welcome to contact LEAF School. Teaching positions will be posted in January on the school website and in local papers.

A Vermont Cabinetmaker

Prior to 1850 many Vermont towns had their own cabinetmakers, usually the more rural a town the less skilled the cabinetmaker. This was mainly a case of economics. A wealthy town like Norwich with Hanover and Dartmouth College as a neighbor had many wealthy citizens. Where there was wealth the more highly skilled cabinetmakers settled.

The subject of this article is Samuel Walker of Grafton, Vermont. Walker (1791-1864) moved from Langdon, New Hampshire about 1817 and established his cabinetmakers shop in Grafton.

The Grafton Historical Society has a chest made by Walker in the Empire style that is signed and dated 1834. Over the years I have owned two or three chests made by Walker.

The Walker chests I have seen have been rather clunky and very plain. These plain, unadorned chests reflect the needs of Walker's modest customers. One Walker chest I bought about 1990 is the exception. It was very well made and artfully designed using cherry and select birdseye maple. That chest is pictured in the photo with this article.

It does exhibit characteristics of a skilled cabinetmaker but also shows Walker was somewhat confused in his design. The backplash has beautiful inlaid oval panels of birdseye maple. On the extreme left and right of the backplash are corresponding vertical oval inlays also of birdseye maple.

The drawer fronts of the chest are inlaid with rectangular birdseye maple panels that clash with the oval panels of the backplash. The corners of the rectangular birdseye maple drawer fronts are blocked as well. While this is a beautiful and striking chest, oval inlays of birdseye maple on the drawer fronts

would be more appealing to the eye.

The supporting columns on the front of the chest have expertly turned urns at the top with concentric turned rings. The main body of the columns are nicely rope turned. The feet are nicely turned Sheraton style with reeded upper sections. The wooden knobs are original. The wooden knobs also reflect Walker controlling cost. Brass pulls would be much more attractive but would have made the chest more expensive. Wood knobs Walker could make. Brass he would have had to

thickness and cut to the precise size as the recessed section and glued in place.

The drawers were hand dovetailed with hand planed drawer bottoms. The backboards were also hand planed and exhibited tool marks from the wood plane Walker used. His inlay work was excellent.

To inlay the birdseye maple panels a cabinetmaker has to remove wood from the cherry surface maybe 3/32" deep and to the exact oval or rectangular shape as seen in this chest. Then the birdseye maple has to be hand planed to that 3/32"


He graduated from Bellows Falls High School and later from the University of New Hampshire.

Don't go hungry for the holidays

WESTMINSTER, Vt.— Winter is a time when many households living with lower incomes are particularly hard-pressed to meet their food expenses, given the added burden of heating costs. Some cut down on the food they consume, or buy cheaper, less nutritious food as a means to cope with these added expenses. And the holiday season can be even more stressful for those households with the added pressure to meet the traditional expectations of giving presents and providing big family dinners. The good news is that

many struggling households can get support for their food costs through 3SquaresVT, and SEVCA is here to help households apply for these benefits.

3SquaresVT is Vermont's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, designed to help households without sufficient resources meet their need for healthy, nutritious food. A family of four earning up to \$3,746 a month may be eligible, and households can have a savings account or an asset like a car or home and still qualify. Whether they are

experiencing a short-term financial crisis or longer-term challenges, 3SquaresVT helps seniors, families, and individuals with lower incomes make ends meet. In fact, 1 in 8 Vermonters already receive 3SquaresVT benefits. Monthly benefits come on a debit card accepted at many grocery stores and farmers' markets, making it easy for households to use them.

SEVCA's Family Services staff are available by appointment to assist households to apply for 3SquaresVT. For more information, call SEVCA toll-free at (800) 464-9951 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday – Friday. Applicants in northern

Windham County may also call that number to schedule an appointment. Brattleboro area applicants should call (802) 254-2795; Springfield area applicants, (802) 885-6153; and White River Junction area applicants, (802) 295-5215. Eligibility and the amount of assistance provided are based primarily on household income, expenses, and household size. The program is open to individuals, families with or without children, seniors, and people with disabilities. There are special rules that make it easier for households that include a senior or a person with a disability to receive benefits.

Burglar appears in court

WHITE RIVER JCT., Vt. – A series of burglaries in Windsor County may have been solved with the arrest of Bradley Elliott, 33, of 51 Andover St., Ludlow.

Elliott pleaded not guilty Monday in Windsor Superior Criminal Court to six counts of burglary.

He allegedly targeted businesses in Springfield, Ludlow and Weathersfield. Superior Court Judge Theresa S. DiMauro ordered him held without bail until a status conference set for Jan. 17.

All charges were filed by the Springfield Town Police Department, some as an assist to other departments, in connection with burglaries at Kwik Stop in Springfield on Sept. 28, P & M Auto in Springfield on Sept. 26, Black Rock Steakhouse in Springfield on Sept. 26, Wellwood Orchard in Weathersfield on Sept. 9, Okemo Valley Golf Course in Ludlow on Sept. 30, and Sam's Steakhouse in Ludlow on Sept. 22.

Elliott was arrested by Springfield

Police on Dec. 16. He has habitual offender status in Vermont, with three grand larceny convictions in 2007 and this year.

A 16-page arrest affidavit says Elliott is believed to be connected with up to 100 burglaries of private homes and businesses in the region.

In the Kwik Stop burglary, Elliott and an accomplice, with the help of a former employee, allegedly broke into the convenience store at 360 River St. in Springfield early on Sept. 28 by smashing the front glass door.

The two took a safe with \$3,704 in cash, including Springfield Transfer Station tickets worth \$247, a store video surveillance system worth \$1,719, and 22 packs of cigarettes val-

ued at \$181. The safe itself was worth \$1,200, police said.

On Sept. 30, Ludlow Police discovered the safe broken open at Proctor Piper State Forest in Cavendish.

Police said a blue money pouch containing \$900 and a safe with \$2,568 were stolen after gaining entry at Okemo Valley Golf Course through a basement door.

In the Wellwood Orchard burglary, \$2,000 in cash and rolled coins were taken.

A cash drawer was reported to have been stolen in the Black Rock Steakhouse burglary. In the Sam's Steakhouse incident, \$900 in tip money was taken.

In the P & M Auto burglary, \$2,500 was stolen, with damage to the building bringing the loss to \$5,348, police said.

Police said the break-ins were committed to get money to purchase drugs. Elliott is represented by Attorney Christopher Dall of Norwich.

THIS AND THAT

Here's hoping each and every one of you has a very enjoyable Holiday Season and take in some chestnuts roasting on an open fire, but do not have Jack Frost nipping at your nose.

This was the most scattered beginning of a winter sports season that I ever remember. The New Hampshire Girls basketball teams started practicing November 14th, the New Hampshire boys took the court a week later on the 21st, while those on the Vermont side of the Connecticut River didn't begin until after Thanksgiving on the 28th. As a coach, I hate the late Vermont start, however it is student and athlete friendly, allowing everyone to enjoy Thanksgiving Weekend.

Fall Mountain football coach John Callahan has stepped down and it looks like the Fall Mountain powers that be, are putting their heads down and going full throttle ahead with the program. Athletic Director Gordon Danserau is playing it coy in letting me know that he knows that there are real football people, who have expressed interest. I know he is telling the truth because friends of former Newport coach Larry McElreavy, who recently coached Newport to a state title, said he would love to give the job a crack, but he had made a two-year commitment to Pembroke Academy. For those who don't know, McElreavy has been a life as a coach at all levels, including leaving his mark at Columbia University. McElreavy has passed his 70th birthday; don't be surprised if he coaches for a number of more seasons. Danserau's expressed interest comment went well beyond McElreavy, so who else could there be?

The Wildcats do plan on competing at the varsity level next year and already have their schedule in hand. The 2017 version is much like the 2016 version; they open Labor Day weekend on the road at Interlakes and have the same number of seemingly alike opponents, three. They don't face Raymond this time around; instead have Farmington/Nute, a similar opponent. The home opener is against Kearsarge in the seasons third week. Sending out the Holiday spirit, hoping somehow interest picks up for the sport in Langdon.

It will be the same old thing in Vermont with Bellows Falls in Division II and Springfield in Division III in football next fall. We were hoping that those in charge would see the light and make four divisions, but that is not what happened. For BF, the present set-up works, yet it still makes things very difficult for Springfield. To us, there is too much humbug in Vermont football. There were several changes and Mount Anthony, Spaulding, Union-32 and Otter Valley will be joining BF in D-II and Burlington and Mount Mansfield will be going up to Division I. Since there will be twelve teams in the Division now, there will only be eight regular season games

and three weeks of play-offs, signaling a change there. Springfield's case is just the opposite; they hope to go to a nine-week regular season and two weeks of play-offs there in Division III. I believe they didn't think that through well enough and many teams will have trouble finding more than seven games to play (unless they play some of their own division teams twice). Division III does lose Union-32 and Otter Valley, which could be a help to the Cosmos.

In case anyone was wondering what my perfect Vermont football system would be: they would have four divisions and the alignment would be decided by both the formula system presently used by the Vermont Independent Football League and the eye test of a well schooled three to five person executive committee. Placement could be appealed, but it would be better to present briefs ahead of time to state where one belongs.

My division I would include: Middlebury, Rutland, Essex, Champlain Valley Union, Bellows Free Academy of St. Albans, Hartford, Colchester and Brattleboro. Division II would be made up of Burlington, South Burlington, Mount Mansfield, Rice, Burr + Burton, Mount Anthony, Bellows Falls and Spaulding. Division III would include Union 32, Lyndon, North Country, Mount Abraham, Otter Valley, Milton, Fair Haven, Mill River, Windsor and Woodstock and this would leave Missisquoi, Springfield, Bellows Free Academy of Fairfax, Poultnery/Mount Saint Joseph Academy and Oxbow. Divisions I thru III would play nine games (two non-league in Divisions I and II) and have two weeks of play-offs and Division IV would play each team in their own division home and away with no play-offs needed unless there was a tie for first place. This formula would not take into account at least a couple of rivalry games played against Division IV teams (Bellows Falls-Springfield and Fair Haven-Poultnery/MSJ) BUT, we encourage the Vermont Principal Association allowing these matchups in the last week of the scrimmage season being played in a game format, charging admission, BUT, not counting on the record. The truth is, they are both glorified exhibitions at the moment.

In closing today, the area lost a sportsman recently who should be remembered. Bellows Falls High School graduate Paul Aumand, who spent much of the later part of his life in Orange, Massachusetts, was a tremendous athlete in both football and basketball, going on to play both sports at a high level at St. Michael's College before returning to his beloved North Walpole. Even though Aumand lived in North Walpole, he helped kids on both sides of the river. He built an outdoor basketball court on the property of North Walpole Elementary School and ran leagues for persons of all ages. I grew up in Bellows Falls, but I felt he cared about me personally as much as those across the river. He did various things to help build his own community. One thing I just learned last week though was that more than once, he took his high-level hoop game to Boston Garden. During the fifties, Bellows Falls and Rutland had very high-level semi-pro basketball teams and they were attractive barnstormers. They were good enough to play more than once, as a prelim to the Boston Celtics. Aumand also coached baseball at the varsity level for Fall Mountain and served as Legion coach at BF. Aumand lived to be 88 and now it is time for this great contributor to rest. That you "Paulie", you were a great man.


Afternoon festivities continued after the concert with refreshments provided by Senior Center regulars as well as a gift exchange.

Fresh snow provides wildlife tracking opportunities

REGION – The bountiful snowfall in Vermont’s woods and field this December provides ample opportunities to head outdoors looking for signs of wildlife. Winter adventurers are encouraged to keep an eye to the snow for tracks this time of year.

While most wild animals are elusive and difficult to spot, fresh snow can be a rare opportunity to witness the abundance of nature. According to a recent survey conducted by a national polling firm, 98 percent of Vermonters expressed the importance of knowing that Vermont’s native wildlife populations are healthy, even if they do not get to see them.

“Winter provides a unique chance to glimpse into the secret world of wild animals that can otherwise remain hidden,” said Alison Thomas, education coordinator for the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department. “I’ve taken novices out tracking in the snow and I’m al-

ways amazed at how excited they are to realize that wildlife is all around us. It makes the otherwise quiet and seemingly empty forest come alive for them.”

Thomas says that tracking wildlife can also be a great way for people to understand the importance of habitat conservation. “Seeing tracks in the snow confirms that wildlife really is out there using the landscape, even if we don’t always see it, and illustrates that it is on the move. Wildlife need healthy and connected

forests and waters to weather winter successfully and move between food and shelter safely.”

Thomas encourages Vermonters to submit tracking photos on the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department Facebook page for help identifying difficult tracks, or if they find something interesting or unusual.

“You don’t have to be an expert to start looking for tracks,” added Thomas. “Even deer or turkeys are easy to spot and identify in fresh snow. And a mouse’s tail dragging

through the soft snow always gives it away.”

Several resources are available for Vermonters interested in learning more about wildlife tracks. Audubon Vermont runs several tracking workshops throughout the winter that are geared towards families and for adults. And Keeping Track is a nonprofit that runs trainings and workshops, in addition to having books and other wildlife tracking resources for sale on their website.

Ice safety tips

REGION – The recent arrival of cold temperature has formed early-season ice on Vermont ponds, lakes and rivers. The Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department reminds winter enthusiasts that ice should never be considered safe and ice conditions vary.

“We are urging all outdoor enthusiasts – people going ice fishing, cross-country skiers, hikers, and snowmobilers -- to be extremely cautious and prepared if they are going to venture out on any ice,” said Vermont Fish & Wildlife Commissioner Louis Porter. “Ice conditions can vary dramatically on different parts of a lake. Remember, even though it may look thick enough on the surface, moving water from currents, rivers and springs can cause ice to form unevenly.”

“Once we have sustained cold weather to form good ice, activities such as ice fishing can be safe and a lot of fun,” said Porter, “but when we go onto the ice, we need to use good judgment and observe several

safety precautions.”

Here are some safety precautions to keep you safe on the ice:

- Leave your car or truck on shore. Every year several motor vehicles go through the ice on Vermont lakes, and some people have drowned as a result.
- Leave information about your plans with someone -- where you intend to fish and when you expect to return.
- Wear a personal flotation device and don’t fish alone.
- Fish with a friend. Ice fishing is a great sport to share with family members and friends, and having a partner with you increases both the fun and the safety.
- Ice varies in thickness and condition. Always carry an ice spud or chisel to check ice as you proceed.
- Be extremely cautious crossing ice near river mouths, points of land, bridges, islands, and over reefs and springs. Current almost always causes ice to be thinner over these areas.

· Avoid going onto the ice if it has melted away from the shore. This indicates melting is underway, and ice can shift position as wind direction changes.

- Waves from open water can quickly break up large areas of ice. If you can see open water in the lake and the wind picks up, get off!
- Bring your fully charged cell phone with you.
- Carry a set of hand spikes to help you work your way out onto the surface of the ice if you go through. Holding one in each hand, you can alternately punch them into the ice and pull yourself up and out. You can make these at home, using large nails, or you can purchase them at stores that sell fishing supplies.
- Carry a safety line that can be thrown to someone who has gone through the ice.
- Heated fishing shanties must have good ventilation to prevent deadly carbon monoxide poisoning. Open a window or the door part way to allow in fresh air.





Eleven ways to help stay sane in a crazy market

REGION - Keeping your cool can be hard to do when the market goes on one of its periodic roller-coaster rides. Here are 11 ways to help keep yourself from making hasty financial decisions.

1. Have a game plan: Having predetermined guidelines that recognize the potential for turbulent times can help prevent emotion from dictating your decisions. For example, you might take a core-and-satellite approach, combining the use of buy-and-hold principles for the bulk of your portfolio with tactical investing based on a shorter-term market outlook. You also can use diversification to try to offset the risks of certain holdings with those of others. Diversification may not ensure a profit or guarantee against a loss, but it can help you understand and balance your risk in advance. And if you're an active investor, a trading discipline can help you stick to a long-term strategy.

2. Know what you own and why you own it: When the market goes off the tracks, knowing why you originally made a specific investment can help you evaluate whether your reasons still hold, regardless of what the overall market is doing. Understanding how a specific holding fits in your portfolio also can help you consider whether a lower price might actually represent a buying opportunity.

And if you don't understand why a security is in your portfolio, find out. That knowledge can be particularly important when the market goes south, especially if you're considering replacing your current holding with another investment.

3. Remember that everything is relative: Most of the variance in the returns of different portfolios can generally be attributed to their asset allocations. If you've got a well-diversified portfolio that includes multiple asset classes, it could be useful to compare its overall performance to relevant benchmarks. If you find that your investments are performing in line with those benchmarks, that realization might help you feel better about your overall strategy.

Even a diversified portfolio is no

guarantee that you won't suffer losses, of course. But diversification means that just because the S&P 500 might have dropped 10% or 20% doesn't necessarily mean your overall portfolio is down by the same amount.

4. Tell yourself that this too shall pass: The financial markets are historically cyclical. Even if you wish you had sold at what turned out to be a market peak, or regret having sat out a buying opportunity, you may well get another chance at some point. Even if you're considering changes, a volatile market can be an inopportune time to turn your portfolio inside out. A well-thought-out asset allocation is still the basis of good investment planning.

5. Be willing to learn from your mistakes: Anyone can look good during bull markets; smart investors are produced by the inevitable rough patches. Even the best investors aren't right all the time. If an earlier choice now seems rash, sometimes the best strategy is to take a tax loss, learn from the experience, and apply the lesson to future decisions. Expert help can prepare you and your portfolio to both weather and take advantage of the market's ups and downs.

6. Consider playing defense: During volatile periods in the stock market, many investors reexamine their allocation to such defensive sectors as consumer staples or utilities (though like all stocks, those sectors involve their own risks, and are not necessarily immune from overall market movements). Dividends also can help cushion the impact of price swings. According to Standard & Poor's, dividend income has represented roughly one-third of the monthly total return on the S&P 500 since 1926, ranging from a high of 53% during the 1940s to a low of 14% in the 1990s, when investors focused on growth.

7. Stay on course by continuing to save: Even if the value of your holdings fluctuates, regularly adding to an account designed for a long-term goal may cushion the emotional impact of market swings. If losses are offset even in part by new savings, your bottom-line number might not be quite so discouraging.

If you're using dollar-cost aver-

aging--investing a specific amount regularly regardless of fluctuating price levels--you may be getting a bargain by buying when prices are down. However, dollar cost averaging can't guarantee a profit or protect against a loss. Also consider your ability to continue purchases through market slumps; systematic investing doesn't work if you stop when prices are down. Finally, remember that the return and principal value of your investments will fluctuate with changes in market conditions, and shares may be worth more or less than their original cost when you sell them.

8. Use cash to help manage your mind-set: Cash can be the financial equivalent of taking deep breaths to relax. It can enhance your ability to make thoughtful decisions instead of impulsive ones. If you've established an appropriate asset allocation, you should have resources on hand to prevent having to sell stocks to meet ordinary expenses or, if you've used leverage, a margin call. Having a cash cushion coupled with a disciplined investing strategy can change your perspective on market volatility. Knowing that you're positioned to take advantage of a downturn by picking up bargains may increase your ability to be patient.

9. Remember your road map: Solid asset allocation is the basis of sound investing. One of the reasons a diversified portfolio is so important is that strong performance of some investments may help offset poor performance by others. Even with an appropriate asset allocation, some parts of a portfolio may struggle at any given time. Timing the market can be challenging under the best of circumstances; wildly volatile markets can magnify the impact of making a wrong decision just as the market is about to move in an unexpected direction, either up or down. Make sure your asset allocation is appropriate before making drastic changes.

10. Look in the rear-view mirror: If you're investing long term, sometimes it helps to take a look back and see how far you've come. If your portfolio is down this year, it can be easy to forget any progress you may already

have made over the years. Though past performance is no guarantee of future returns, of course, the stock market's long-term direction has historically been up. With stocks, it's important to remember that having an investing strategy is only half the battle; the other half is being able to stick to it. Even if you're able to avoid losses by being out of the market, will

you know when to get back in? If patience has helped you build a nest egg, it just might be useful now, too.

11. Take it easy: If you feel you need to make changes in your portfolio, there are ways to do so short of a total makeover. You could test the waters by redirecting a small percentage of one asset class to another. You could put any new money into investments

you feel are well-positioned for the future. You could set a stop-loss order to prevent an investment from falling below a certain level, or have an informal threshold below which you will not allow an investment to fall before selling. Even if you want to adjust your portfolio during a period of turmoil, those changes should happen in gradual steps.
