# Rockingham hear updates on Garage Project, hosts informational meeting —

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. – On Tuesday, Feb. 16, the Rockingham Selectboard discussed the Bellows Falls Garage Project. The Windham Windsor Housing Trust requested approval for an additional \$50,000 through the Vermont Community Development Program. Executive Director Elizabeth Bridgewater said it was the last step of funding to bridge the gap of a \$4 million increase to their budget.

Bridgewater explained that two issues created the funding gap: the deterioration of the concrete structure and the foundation, which was not capable of carrying the weight of the improvements.

Director of Housing Peter Paggi explained this led to a change in plans involving a new structure using woodframe construction and the removal of underground parking for increased stability to the foundation.

Bridgewater said they received "really good feedback" at several public meetings. WWHT responded to community priorities and planned to preserve the historic front facade and provide commercial space on Rockingham Street.

When questioned about parking, Paggi explained that WWHT purchased the land adjacent to the garage to offer 12 onsite spaces. He said the rest would be provided through municipal or private lots.

Barbara Ternes supported the project. "I think it's a win-win. A decrepit building that's being put to use and made beautiful, the tax base of the town goes up, [and] we expand the housing."

Pat Fowler said, "On behalf of BFDDA, we appreciate the hard work that's been going on."

When Bonnie North asked for clarification on income restrictions, Paggi explained there were seven units restricted to 120% of the area median income, so families with income up to \$79,000 and single persons up to \$60,000 would be eligible. The remaining 20 were between 50-60% of the median income, which is roughly \$30,000-\$35,000.

Bridgewater said there would be another meeting before the Design Review Board and Town Planner Chuck Wise would post that information.

An informational meeting held Feb. 18 offered Rockingham residents the opportunity to ask questions about Town Meeting, March 1, which voters are able to attend either by Zoom or in person at the Town Hall

For the in-person attendeees, Municipal Manager Scott Pickup explained the town will need to collect contact information including address, phone number, and email for contact-tracing and to meet Vermont state guidelines for town meetings. More information will be available on the www.rockinghamvt. org website.

There was a suggestion to quicken the process by having attendees write their personal information on an index card.

Pickup asked for "understanding and cooperation" for those attending. He explained that Town Hall would be limited to 75 people, which is fewer than the required 50% for fire safety occupancy.

The Town Report is available online or at Lisai's Market and the Corner Deli, Saxtons River Market, Town Hall, Police Department, Village Square Booksellers, and People's Bank. Pickup said the audit would be

available on the website and at Town Hall as soon as possible.

Absentee ballots will be accepted at Town Hall through Monday, March 1 by 4 p.m., and by 7 p.m. Tuesday, March 2 at the polls at the Masonic Temple.

The Selectboard asks that Zoom attendees provide first and last name, raise their hand, and turn the camera on to speak, all of which can be accessed by

# Kurn Hattin Food Services perseveres, stays on course

WESTMINSTER, Vt. – The pandemic has presented challenges in various areas including the Food Service Department at Kurn Hattin Homes for Children. Everything that was done in the past had to be modified and adjusted to meet the state's requirements for safety and physical distancing.

Before returning in July from remote learning, the kitchen staff had to construct plexiglass barriers on the serving line to provide protection for the children and staff diners as well as the kitchen staff. Floor decals

that showed proper distancing were purchased and placed on the floors.

Following new procedures at mealtimes, the children and staff come to the kitchen in small groups and return to their classrooms to eat. For breakfast, all meals are eaten in the cottages where the children live. Food is transported there in insulated containers to maintain the desired temperature upon arrival. Suppertime has been split into groups to allow for proper physical distancing.

While all of this is different and challenging, Kurn Hat-

tin has persevered with the support of the entire school staff, maintenance team, and staff from other departments who have stepped in to help. Having worked in the maritime industry, the Food Service Director Richard Johnson is very familiar with having "all hands on deck."

# Jedediah Popp new director for the Windham County Consortium on Substance Use

SPRINGFIELD, Vt. - Health Care and Rehabilitation Services announced that Jedediah Popp has been hired as the new project co-director for the Windham County Consortium on Substance Use. Popp will join Rosie Nevins-Alderfer, who has been director of the consortium for the past year, as co-director.

As they seek to expand their impact, the COSU is focused on incorporating people with lived experience into their organization in order to enhance supports for residents living with substance use disorder. By centering the voices and experience of those most impacted by substance use in their leadership, the COSU can create a movement for change in the community that puts life and relationships at its core.

Popp humbly shares his own

story in order to help those living with the impact of substance use disorder. Following many years of opiate use, Popp was homeless when he arrived in Brattleboro in 2012 and would remain homeless for close to a year. During his history with substance use, Popp had multiple incidences where Narcan was administered due to overdose. He credits interventions like this, as well as support from the Brattleboro community and the relationships he developed, with saving his life and helping him to recover from substance use issues and get back on his

These strong relationships also provide Popp with a strong starting off point in his new role. He hopes to expand COSU collaborations across Windham County. "I've been building and developing relationships with

most of the COSU members since coming to Brattleboro, where I met them through the services they provided. These relationships were life-saving to me at that specific time, because I was experiencing a significant amount of loss from 10 years of opiate use. So these relationships are very meaningful to me on a personal level and also now on a professional level," states Popp.

Popp was recently employed at HCRS as a case manager in Windham County. He has a long history of working in the community to bring people together, creating connections, and uplifting the voices of those most impacted by substance use disorders. Beyond his ability to connect on an authentic human level, Popp is a savvy systems thinker, with the ability to analyze root causes and see op-

portunities to create structural change.

According to Nevins-Alderfer, "He brings a great deal of heart and empathy to his work – and I believe this will empower the COSU to greatly broaden its capacity to build meaningful relationships and shift meaningfully toward leadership that is driven by the people most impacted."

Popp states, "My aspirations for this new position are to use my lived experience – and the lived experience of others – to help direct COSU in a way that, in the end, would end overdose deaths in Windham County completely and help people get their basic needs met with dignity. My heart hurts every time I hear of an overdose death and, at the same time, I feel so much empathy for people who've just lost a friend, relative, or loved

one. It doesn't have to be like this – we can do more as a community to help keep people alive and provide them with resources"

The co-directors will be working together to develop new positions specifically targeted for people with lived experience and helping to foster a work environment where a person's lived experience is valued. Those with lived experience will have a significant role in the development, design, and implementation of new programs.

plementation of new programs. COSU is a countywide collaboration of local organizations that work across the continuum of substance use prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery to address the impacts of opioid and other substance use. HCRS is the fiscal agent for this program. Organizational membership currently includes

# Town Meetin'-

Here are select minutes from known to her, her 1870s Chester Town Meetings. For our upcoming book, "History of Chester's Fire Departments" we will include these and other relevant minutes. This article existed in one form or another for several years. I think readers will find it interesting. Fire District #2 is Yo-Semite Engine Hall.

Town Meeting March 23,

Article 4: "To see if the town will vote to authorize and instruct the selectmen to draw on the Town Treasury for the amount not to exceed \$1500. As the town may vote payable to the treasurer of Fire District #2 for the purpose defraying a portion of the expense said district has incurred in the purchase of a Fire Engine and other apparatus for the extinguishment of fires. Voted to dismiss the

Town Meeting March 5,

Article 10: "To see if the town will vote to raise \$800. Or any other sum of money for the purpose of Assisting Fire District #2 in said Chester in building an Engine House. Voted to dismiss."

Town Meeting March 25,

"To see if the town will vote to pay Fire District #2 any part of the expense of erecting their Engine House. Or be paid when engine house is completed. Voted to dismiss the article."

The following article I found in Mary Harris's scrapbook. This tragic story, while not a structure fire, will be included in our upcoming book. This occurred near Bailey's Mills, north of Kim Kendall.

May 1, 1908


sister decided to burn them. The fire ran along the dry grass towards the barn and fearing the building would catch, Mrs. Burke turned to the house for water to stop the fire.

"When near the shed which opens into the kitchen, she discovered that the back of clothing was ablaze. Running into the shed she sat down in the tub, which was used to catch the running water, but this only served to drive the flames toward the front. She then

ran into kitchen and took the dipper and returning to the tub tried to throw water upon herself. Her sister who was visiting a neighbor Mrs. Bernice Earle in the front of the house heard the dipper rattle in sink and at the same time Mrs. Earle thought she heard Mrs. Burke call 'Marcia.'

'They hurried into the kitchen to find it full of smoke and Mrs. Burke at the door with her clothing all burned off except for her shoes and part of her corsets. The flesh was burned that it fell away from her. In spite of the intense suffering her first thought was for the fire which was creeping toward the barn and Mrs. Earle hurried out to call help for that which Miss Bailey was telephoning for the Doctor, Mrs. Burke walked up the stairs and removed what was left of her corsets and put on a wrapper.

"Her suffering for the first twenty-four hours was beyond description as she was conscious all the time and realizing everything. Her death which occurred at midnight Saturday was merciful. Mrs. Burke was fifty-eight years old a daughter of Mrs. Willard, Bailey's Mills who [died] last winter. She was a widow of the late Theron Davis and leaves one daughter Allie Davis now Mrs. Waldo Stevens. She later married Mr. Sidney Burke who had one daughter Abbie Burke a schoolgirl who Mrs. Burke has been a devoted stepmother and three sons, Aden, Sidney, and Fred Burke. Mr. Burke died several years ago. Much sympathy is expressed for the relatives, for the shock of the terrible death will be long felt. The funeral was held in the Congregational church Tuesday at two o'clock, the pastor Rev. H. I. Ballou officiated assisted by Rev. I. P. Booth of the

members in 32 different states. The largest neo-Nazi group in the U.S. is the National Socialist Movement, which is estimated to have 400 members. Regarding the Ku Klux Klan, the Wikipedia entry states the KKK has "between 5,000 and 8,000 members nationwide." In the 1920s, the KKK included about 15% of the nation's population, or about 4-5 million men.

Today the U.S. is a nation of 323.1 million people. In our republic, if the experts are to be trusted, there exists an estimated 9,200 philosophically committed militant racists. This is 0.000028% of our popu-

In the last century the hearts and minds of an overwhelming majority of Americans have undergone a massive, positive paradigm shift in how we view one another. This is the good news. The bad news is how sad it is to see so many good citizens buying into the media narrative that anyone who has an opposing view on political or economic issues is somehow a Nazi, a bigot, a racist, or a white supremacist.

I have my own solution to put out the raging fire that the media continues to pour gas on. I am shutting off my television and turning off the computer. I am going to call my black friends, my white friends, my Indian friends, my conservative friends, and my liberal friends, and tell them how much I love them - not because of their color or political views, but for simply being good friends. It is a small act. One has to start somewhere.

My first meeting with constituents was Saturday, Feb. 6. I must say it was one of the most fun hours I have spent in my first four weeks as a legislator! Fourteen people were in the Zoom room and our conversation was moderated by my

legislative aide Alexis Drown.

People attended from Athens, Brookline, Grafton, and Rockingham. The advantage of Zoom, of course, was that no one had to drive on a Saturday morning - although, we did take a brief moment to imagine that we were at Moon Dog Cafe, MKT, or one of our libraries. I am really looking forward to a time, likely in the summer, when we all have had our immunizations and can start reconnecting in person. It will be interesting to see how we can combine the best of Zoom with the best of being together.

We reviewed the status of legislation introduced this session. Of

the over 200 bills introduced so far, only a small percentage will actually be acted upon. We discussed the bills that I have signed onto, including H.94, the Transportation Modernization Act aimed at reducing CO2 emissions from the Vermont transportation sector -44% of greenhouse gas emissions come from this sector, the worst in New England. I am also supporting H.171, an act that expands eligibility and funding for our early education childcare system. Covid-19 has shown us how important early childhood education is to our children, our families, and our econo-

We reviewed bills that are being evaluated in Health Care, the committee I serve on. The major one is reimbursing clinicians for telephone visits at the same rate as in-person visits once the pandemic has passed. This is a complicated

question, which takes into account broadband access, transportation in rural areas, and health equity. For those who want to learn more, the Legislative website is an excellent resource for any and all bills moving through the 14 committees of the House.

We discussed how I can help constituents gain access to state government and to my colleagues in the House who are experts in their specific committee's subject matter. If you or someone you know has an issue or a question, please contact me at lgoldman@leg.state.vt.us or call 802-869-2989.

# Nancy M. Stone Shepard, 1926-2021

WALPOLE, N.H. - Nancy Morgan Stone Shepard, 94, passed away peacefully at her home in Walpole Feb. 7, 2021. Nancy was a world traveler who ended up calling Walpole home after moving to Smoke Rise Farm, the family farm, in 1994.

Nancy was born Aug. 28, 1926, in New Haven, Conn., the daughter of Laurence and Aletha (Knapp) Stone. Most of her childhood was spent in Madison, Conn., along the Connecticut Sound while spending time at the farm in Walpole. After graduating from Prospect Hill School in New Haven, she set out for fame and fortune in the bright lights of New York City where she graduated from the Tobe Coburn School of Design. She proudly remembered living in Greenwich Village during the '50s and '60s when a fourth floor, cold water, walk-up flat could be rented for less than \$100 per month.

It was while working for Webb and Knapp, a real estate development firm in Manhattan, that she met the love of her life, Robert Shepard, a Swiss-born developer and fellow global traveler. Together, they spent time traveling around the U.S. and Europe. Avid sailors, they cruised up and down the East Coast on their sailboat, En Rapport, including when Bob participated in a trans-Atlantic race that ended at the Isle of Wright off the coast of England where they spent a summer enjoying the tropical paradise.

In 1960, they bought an orange grove on the outskirts of Miami where they spent several years raising oranges and battling the bugs and the humidity. They spent a year abroad in Bangkok, Thailand, as part of a business exchange program where Nancy taught English and learned to eat spicy Thai food. After traveling around the globe, they finally settled on an overgrown farm on Maryland's eastern shore, which they restored into a gracious home overlooking the Little Choptank River. Bob's unexpected death in 1979 shook her world and Nancy eventually sold the farm and moved into a wonderfully formal house called "The Glenburn" in Cambridge, Md. She worked as a parole officer for the state of Maryland until she got fed up with the bugs and humidity, moving to Walpole in 1994.

On her arrival at Smoke Rise Farm, she attacked the property with her usual exuberance, transforming the old farmhouse into an elegant residence and restoring the woodshed and barn. Her gardens prospered in the rich farm soil; she grew beautiful peonies, daffodils, and tulips. She was active in the Old Homestead and Monadnock Garden Clubs, was an award-winning floral designer and Judge Emeritus for the Federated Garden Clubs of Vermont. She was also a regular exhibitor at the Boston Flower Show and Art in Bloom at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. In Walpole, she was active with the Friends of the Library and Women of Walpole.

Nancy is survived by her two sisters, Aletha C. Spang of New Jersey and Betsy S. Johnson of Ohio; as well as a multitude of beloved nieces and nephews and their families as well as many cherished friends around the Monadnock region and be-




