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BFUHS junior captures back-to-back titles ——

WESTMINSTER, Vt. -Bellows Falls Union High School (BFUHS) junior and Bellows Falls resident Laura Kamel recently captured her second consecutive track and field Division III State Championship in the discus. Her toss of 34.34 meters was tops in the state in her division at the Southern Vermont League Championship. Laura also placed eighth in the state in the javelin with a throw of 22.42 meters, and also competed in the high jump.

These outstanding achievements are quite a "feat" (pun intended) for Kamel, who actually won her first discus state title the previous year – the Division II title – after having come off a fractured bone in her foot.

"I started throwing the discus halfway through the season my freshman year, and had the broken foot, so I couldn't do much except watch and learn," Laura said in a recent interview. "I was encouraged by a couple of my friends, but one of my previous teachers, Jen Perry, really helped convince me to join, and I'm very grateful to her every day for it."

Along with her track and field endeavors, Laura also plays BFUHS soccer in the fall, basketball in the winter, and she rides horses year-round. Her quick rise in the discus, however, is unique, and a great example of an individual athlete not only absorbing and then executing her coaching, but also persevering through adversity with her injury.

"My coaching has just been amazing," Laura said.

"Kim Lunna has really helped me a lot, and not just by coaching technique, but also pushing me to be at my best and really giving me the opportunity to work on and improve my skills."

Laura also credits her parents for doing their homework as well, researching and offering their daughter different drills and skills tips to help give her any edge as she improves her techniques. "My parents have helped me a lot to improve, along with my coaches from other sports. The work and skills that I do (for other sports) are so beneficial for track as well.

"Much thanks to my basketball coach James Pecsok, and my soccer coach Holly King, for helping me to grow in different ways that I know will help me in my sports career and future."

Laura also talked about how participating in the state championship helped her to gain experience and more confidence

"The New Eng-[regional championship] has been an amazing experience – going there the last two vears - because it has shown me that although I may be one of the best in my small town, there's also competition outside of the state that can be completely different," Laura con-

"It was a bit of a culture shock going there, given these are the top athletes in each state, so I had my

work cut out for sure. These girls didn't mess around, and it felt very serious and intimidating at first, but all the athletes were supportive of each other and we would all chat like we were on the same team in between events."

Moving forward, Laura is looking to improve scores in all her events and will train in between her current commitments to school and basketball. "I'm also really excited for the upcoming track and field season, because it looks like we are going to have more girls coming out and additional coaching, so I'm optimistic we will have more athletes qualifying for New England's so we can better represent our school. Personally, I'm looking forward to my junior season and the competition I will be facing this year." Can you say "three-peat" for Laura? Stay tuned.

ROCKINGHAM, Vt. -Are you getting close to Exit 6 so you can make it to Okemo Mountain to enjoy a ski vacation? Just 2,000 feet off of Interstate 91 to the right when you get to the bottom of the exit ramp, you will find a bright red building with a staff that is sure to bring fun into your dispensary experience. A local, popular, serial entrepreneur, Joe Ruggiero (yes, the family that owns the local trash removal service), embarked on a journey to open the first dispensary in Rockingham, Vt., over 18 months ago.

In a somewhat crowded dispensary field, each dispensary has its own flair. Stepping into Rolling Twenties, the thought immediately was that it wasn't the décor that was the focus; void of expensive artwork, or an air of superiority, it was clear that this is family-run and operated.

Immediately the famous budtender Brad Walsh was able to break the ice. What is the importance of a well-versed budtender? This person shepherds the customer through the process, whether it is someone trying a gummy to help with sleep, or a seasoned veteran cannabis customer that just wants to talk shop or trends. Walsh, with four years of budtender experience from other states that legalized recreational cannabis before Vermont, is eagerly waiting to have the opportunity to show his education, and emphasize his love for the field, saying, "When you have a passion about something, it shows."

Quentin Taylor, one of the other now famous budtenders, meets you at the security desk and is the first to say a hello and ask about your day.

Bellows Falls powerlifters break records —

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. – Each with their own personal reason for taking up the sport, six local powerlifters have put in the time, determination, and dedication to achieve record-breaking results.

During a competition last November in Brattleboro, the group broke Vermont and New Hampshire records in their divisions, as well as setting American Powerlifting Association (APA) national records. Following that, the team went on to compete again just two weeks later in Gardner, Mass., where they broke even more records.

The common denominator connecting the group is trainer, coach, and competitor Meg Letson. Formerly a trainer at Greater Rock Fitness in Bellows Falls, Letson now works out of her own gym in her renovated garage, built when the pandemic forced everything to shut down.

Letson said that it took between two and three years to fully complete the gym, recalling that when she first started seeing clients there, her motorcycle still stood off to one side. Now, the small but well-equipped space is the training hub for the group of powerlifters.

Referring to the back-to-back competitions where the team excelled, Letson explained, "We don't typically plan two meets with only two weeks between. I wouldn't advise it, as the body needs more recovery [time] following a peak performance. But we were invited to attend and couldn't resist. We did surprisingly well."

At 47 years old, Letson has been a personal trainer for nearly 15 years. Her first powerlifting competition was in 2017. Powerlifting is a sport consisting of three exercises: the

bench press, the deadlift, and the squat. Out of the team of six competitors, Letson is the one of the youngest.

Among them, the group boasts some impressive statistics. Anne Nordstrom from Walpole, N.H., holds a national record in bench press, (125 pounds) and is 59 years old. Mike Foster from Bellows Falls, who holds state records in all three events and can bench press 280 pounds, is 60 years old.

Pam Parant, also from Bellows Falls, is 63, a national record holder in all three powerlifting events, and an "unofficial" world record holder. Letson explained, "It's only unofficial because Pam hasn't traveled to [for instance] Poland to attend the world competitions."

Parant is soft spoken and petite at 123 pounds, but she currently can bench press 130 pounds, deadlift 245 pounds, and squat holding 165 pounds on her shoulders.

Martha Rowley began working with Letson about eight years ago, after having hip replacement surgery. "Meg encourages you," she said. "You may not think you can do something, but she knows you can. And she never pushes you."

"She makes strong suggestions," Foster added, drawing laughs from the group.

Rowley admits she more than "rose to the occasion," training with Letson several times a week, starting to enter competitions in the past couple of years. Rowley recently broke a national record in her

age and weight class, deadlifting 77.5 pounds. She is 74 years old.

Rowley enjoys how strong she has become from powerlifting. She said her bone scan improved because of the consistent strength training workouts. "I used to have horses, and could lift a feed bag no problem," Rowley remarked. "But before I started training with Meg, I'd lost that strength. And now, I can lift three times the weight of that feed bag."

Nordstrom commented that she first came to see Letson to improve her tennis serve. Her interest and love of competitive powerlifting only grew the more she participated. "Plus," Nordstrom exclaimed, "now no one can return my serve!"

Twenty-five-year-old Tess Kinney from Westminster also competes with the group, as does Bellows Falls resident Bill Purdy, aged 66. Letson's wish is for "people to realize it is possible to start at any age. This crew represents that"

Strength training has been proven to be an effective way to maintain a healthy lifestyle, especially as we age, and the Bellows Falls powerlifters are proof of that.

Additionally, as Foster commented, "It's also about committing to a schedule, encouraging, and holding each other accountable."

The social and mental health benefits are apparent, as illustrated by one of the group's mottos, "strength is a

Springfield passes fiscal year 2025 budget —

SPRINGFIELD, Vt. – Only a handful of public participants were in attendance at the Monday, Jan. 15, public hearing and presentation of the town budget for fiscal year 2025.

Town manager Jeff Mobus reported that the proposed budget represents a 5.1% increase in gross expenditures, and a 9.3% increase in gross non-tax revenues, resulting in an increase to the amount to be raised by the taxpayers of 3.87%.

The budget does not fund any new positions,

but does include a 4% cost of living adjustment for all town employees, and step increases as required by union contracts, Mobus stated.

Historically, the select-board has added articles to the warning for paving and sidewalks. Last year, the paving article was \$750,000, and this year's article proposes \$825,000. For sidewalk repairs, the amount remains the same at \$100,000.

Springfield resident Jean Bolaski of Walker Road was at the meeting to present the board with her complaints about lack of paving and maintenance to her road. After some back and forth, the board said they would take her comments into consideration.

Discussing rising costs and declining road conditions, the board called on town treasurer Barbara Courchesne to report on several petitions for additional appropriations that would potentially add to the yearly cost. These include Springfield Community Players' request for \$2,500, Springfield Chorus' for \$1,500, and the Bellows Falls Community Bike Program, who petitioned for \$1,000. Courchesne said the petitions were not final yet, and the organizations had until Jan. 18 to complete them.

Board member Walter Martone remarked that the special requests may not be

approved, but if the petitions qualify for the ballot they are likely to pass. "That means the increase could be even larger than what we are talking about here," Martone said.

Mobus felt, at a total of \$5,000 for all three, the impact of the additional appropriations on the overall budget would be minimal.

Following the discussion, Board Chair Kristi Morris looked to the three citizens participating via Zoom for questions before addressing Bolaski, commenting, "We only had one public participant? To your credit, thank you for coming in."

Morris closed the public

hearing at 6:39 p.m. The board motioned to approve the fiscal year 2025 budget, with a gross appropriation that the voters will vote on at Town Meeting, at \$15,009,263.

Board member Everett Hammond, who had expressed a need for a larger allotment of funds to go toward paving costs earlier, spoke up again, defending his recommendation that \$50,000 be added to the paving article. Alternatively, Hammond suggested splitting that amount between the article and the regular budget, adding \$25,000 to

Vice Chair Michael Martin agreed with Hammond's request to further increase paving funds, stating, "I have long been a proponent of increasing our paving budget, since I got on to the board, and I've championed increases to our paving budget each year." Martin said the voters have typically "stepped up to the challenge," and agreed to the proposed increases.

John Bond, BAC chair, commented that the added expenses thus far have increased the percentage to almost 4%, and adding \$50,000 would have them "creeping toward 5%. think it's a little insensitive and not in keeping with our bigger goal of marketing Springfield and getting people to move here," Bond said, expressing his concern that a higher tax rate makes Springfield less competitive.

Ultimately, the board voted unanimously to approve the proposed budget at gross appropriation set at \$15,009,263, and the paving and sidewalk articles as pre-

The selectboard will next meet on Monday, Jan. 22.



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Cross writing

What is cross writing? I can only speak from my own experience from handling these early pieces of ephemera. In my 50 years buying and selling early letters and other old documents, I have only seen a handful of cross letters. Here is one I managed to hang on to. I think some will find this interesting.

It's really difficult to read – and this is on both sides of a 7.5-inch by 9.5-inch piece of paper. The author was competent writing with a quill pen. Probably it was a gold nib, housed in an abalone or wooden pen-shaped instrument. She knew when to dip the nib in the ink, to reload the nib with ink, and continue writing. It is flawless, with very fine letters.

In those days, penmanship was taught in schools. The paper has yellowed, and the old iron-based ink turned brown, and soiled some, so it's difficult to read, but here is some of what I can make out. There

is more to be gleaned from this letter.

The photo with this article is a close-up of a small section of the letter. I'm not sure how well it will reproduce on newsprint. Read what you can, and then turn the newspaper 90 degrees to your right, to continue reading. In part, it reads:

"Proctorsville, Vt, March 13th, 1850

My dearest [illegible], I do wish that it were in my power to write you an interesting letter, full of life and good spirits, but I am dull and what is worse so nervous that I scarcely know what I am about. Your blessed letter of Feb. 20th is safely here and having only delayed one day I hasten to send this envelope full to you ['full to you' is in reference to cross writing]..."

It then goes on for a page regarding how others are doing or gifts received. The letter continues:

"...I am very happy when I think of you at Anchonca. I hope the pleasure you enjoy there may be some reward for the tears you shed while you prepared for Mount Holyoke. I hope you do not regret having gone there or the consequent trip to Mississippi. It is one of the pleasantest events I ever think of. I have been solicited to teach here, the older school this summer. I would not hesitate could I make my parents more comfortable or happy, to undertake the task, but as I can not accomplish any thing for them I intend to go to Mr. Mason's as soon as the travelling is good and remain till I go Westward. They very cordially invite me to do so. I have written to Mifs Coxe and shall know, I presume before I write you again what my prospect will be for returning to Cincinnati. If she does not wish me to teach with her, I must make some other plan. I have not told you that I have received a letter from the Trustees of Fayette Academy. The Rev. Mr. Curtis of New Orleans is expected to take the academy. He is Methodist and is recommended by Bro. Drake..."

From Wikipedia: "A crossed letter is a manuscript letter which con-

tains two separate sets of writing, one written over the other at right-angles. This was done during the early days of the postal system in the 19th century to save on expensive postage charges, as well as to save paper. This technique is

also called cross-hatching

or cross-writing.

A cross letter is distinct from a palimpsest, as crosshatched manuscripts were written this way at one sitting or for the same purpose (such as a diary), rather than being re-used later."

AI and the Rumsey Map Collection in genealogy

Wayne Blanchard, coof Windham founder County Genealogy Interest Group and genealogy volunteer at Rockingham Library, will give us his insights into artificial intelligence (AI) and its current and future use in genealogy. Artificial intelligence is expanding into all sorts of areas, and genealogy is no exception. Although it can't replace the human genealogist, some of the new tools can be very helpful. AI is used in colorizing black and white photos, translating records into another language, transcribing and indexing records or newspaper articles, extracting and summarizing information from a document, and creating a genealogical sketch of an ancestor. Companies such as Ancestry and My Heritage are beginning to incorporate AI in their websites to support users in their family research. Wayne Blanchard has been experimenting with some of these tools, and he will

share what he has learned. Jerry Carbone of Whetstone Brook Genealogy will discuss the massive map collection, using the David Rumsey Map Collection for genealogy. The David Rumsey Map Collection at Stanford University began in 1966, and contains more than 200,000 maps, 128,000 of which are online. The collection focuses on rare maps from the 1550s through the present day. The collection's scope is worldwide, but is very strong on various maps of the United States. The collection includes atlases, globes, wall maps, school geographies, pocket maps, books of exploration, maritime charts, and a variety of cartographic materials including pocket, wall, children's, and manuscript maps. Maps of importance for genealogical use are property, insurance, railroad, military, and topographic maps. The presentation will focus on how to find the maps and use the various tools that are part of the collection.

The Windham County Genealogy Interest Group is an informal organization whose members are dedicated to genealogy education, research, and best practices. Meetings are held every other month on Zoom. Many of these sessions were recorded and are available on the WCGIG YouTube Channel at www. bit.ly/WCGIGVIDEO. They cover topics such as improving your search results in www.familysearch.org and www.ancestry.com; using family tree software; navigating the crowd sourced cemetery database Find A Grave; using land records for genealogy research; using www.americanancestors. org, the database of the New England Historical Genealogical Society; and finding people in the newly released 1950 U.S. Census.

WCGIG is also supported by Brooks Me-Library morial Brattleboro, Vt., and Rockingham Free Library in Bellows Falls, Vt., with use of their Zoom accounts, publicity, and use of their facili-
