# Fletcher Farm School new board chair —

After managing daily operations and serving as board chair, Susan Damone Balch will shift to solely focusing on her administrative role. The board welcomes acclaimed metalwork artist and longtime Fletcher Farm School teaching artist Piper Strong as its new chairperson. Strong brings over a decade of leadership experience in the Vermont arts community.

"We're thrilled to have Piper lend her creativity and management talents to lead Fletcher Farm School at this pivotal moment," said outgoing Chair Susan Balch. "Her passion for the arts and connecting people through hands-on learning is perfectly suited to guide us through renewal

and growth."

After enrollment declines and financial hardship in 2023, Fletcher Farm is pausing public programming for 2024. The school also plans to bring on an outside consultant to lead a strategic planning and redevelopment process. To date, the organization has raised more than \$15,000 to commit to the strategic initiative.

Ford expressed that they took a lot of consideration into each space, trying to get 80-90% usage in each room all day, otherwise questioning if they need that room or not. The cafeteria, for example, is currently only used two to three hours a day, but could be used throughout day for events and projects under the proposed new design. The auditorium can also be used for lectures and other events. There is a double gym design for the benefit of the middle and high school students. There are "no spaces in this design plan that would be empty for long periods," which saved a lot of space in the overall design. "We thought really long and hard about every square foot." The bond repayment for the project would not start until summer of 2027, which gives taxpayers three and a half years before it will impact education property taxes. They provided an example that a home with a fair market value of \$300,000 and a household income of \$85,000, would see an increase of about \$60 per month in taxes. Each student enrolled in the district reduces the annual amount needed to be raised from taxpayers by about \$20,000. If the school district gains 10 or more students per year, "the taxes would be inverted, and benefit back to the taxpayers" after year 15 of the bond

The new contract would cost \$6,500 for one year, and Rentalscape would provide data collection and 24/7 complaint hotline services. Chester would continue to process renewals of STR registrations in-house, which they had been forced to do previously, as Granicus had not made good on their commitment to do this for the town. Bristow explained that processing renewals manually was not a major inconvenience for Chester, which currently has fewer than 60 STRs, compared to other towns with much higher

Wednesday, Jan. 17, with most of the meeting taken up by continued discussion of the town's short-term rental (STR) ordinance.

Prior to taking up the STR discussion, town manager Julie Hance informed the board that, earlier that day, the town had received a letter from the lawyer representing Julian Brothers LLC, owners of a controversial quarry in the town, withdrawing their conditional use application for the quarry. Hance read the letter to the board, which stated that, "Much of what was originally proposed is no longer part of the plans," and that the company has "heard and considered the comments of neighbors, which has caused it to rethink how it wishes to operate." This met with confusion and skepticism from the board, though at this time no further information was available.

The board then moved on to its STR discussion. Chester is still in the midst of a moratorium on new STRs, and the board is working to determine what amendments, if any, it would like to make to the current ordinance, which requires registration and the payment of a registration fee.

Town planner and zoning administrator Preston Bristow laid out for the board a number of options for them to consider, which he said was based on his research of what ordinances towns across Vermont and numbers of STR units. During discussion, the board made clear that their primary concern is with "unhosted" STRs - those which do not have an owner or associated caretaker present while guests are staying in the rental. Hosted STRs were largely exempt from any of the proposed further regulations.

After significant back and forth, the board decided not to pursue the possibility of a residency requirement, which would have effectively banned unhosted STRs, or of a conditional use review. The latter option was rejected based on the fact that it is tied to the property itself, not the owner, and is therefore difficult or imposdid ask for more data on several possible options, which were a waiting period after purchase to register an unhosted STR, a cap on total STRs in the town, a density limit, a limit on number of STRs per owner, a ban on corporate STR ownership, and an increase in the fee to register an unhosted STR.

Several of these options generated some discussion, in particular the density limit. The board considered whether or not the density limit should be enacted on a per-zone basis, with different limits for the residential and rural zones, as well as whether the measurements for density would be from the home or from the property line. Planning Commission Chair Hugh Quinn noted that, while most of the homes in the rural zone are spread out, "There are what I would consider 'neighborhoods' in the rural areas." Quinn said he lives in such a neighborhood, with four houses grouped close together, half of which are now STRs. The board determined to factor this into their consideration of the density limit regulations.

The Chester Selectboard will hold their next regularly scheduled meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 7, at 6:30 p.m., in the Chester Town Hall.

PLYMOUTH, Vt. – The majority of the Jan. 16 Plymouth Selectboard meeting was a presentation from Mountain Views Supervisory Union (MVSU) Board Chair Keri Bristow, Vice Chair Ben Ford, and Plymouth representatives Elliot Rubin and Josh Linton, on the proposed Woodstock Middle/High School reconstruction, and how that will impact Plymouth taxpayers.

Plymouth is one of seven towns in the Woodstock school district, and was the first town to see the presentation. The extensive project, which includes rebuilding an entirely new school, demolishing the old building, and constructing a new football field on the existing building property, has a price tag of \$99 million.

The current building was built in 1958, is in major disrepair, and rated the second worst high school facility in the State of Vermont. Ford explained that the building cannot be remodeled due to the dated materials and concrete cinder block structure. They have a broken HVAC system that leaves students and staff either "boiling" hot or extremely cold, and below standard and acceptable temperatures. The sewage has been

#### to one shower in the locker room because the mixing valve cannot be repaired from behind the cinderblock walls. There are "horror stories" of all the things that need to be addressed. Bristow added, though it is not a pleasant environment, the air and water quality are being monitored to ensure everyone's safety.

About 70% of the revenue that funds the school comes from education property tax, the remaining funds from sales and use taxes, school choice students, and other sources. Ford assured that the MVSU is trying to keep taxpayers in mind and "cap the impact of taxes that a project like this can have... [and] set a limit so voters can have some confidence," and not be hit too hard. The board scaled back on some of the designs and ideas, which reduced the budget by \$16 million, to bring the project down to the current estimated \$99 million.

Ford also explained that the board is hoping a state school construction program will be offered again in the near future, which would help reimburse some of the construction costs. The proposed design for the Woodstock school comes in at \$627 per square foot, which is within the new state standards to be eligible if the program returns. Ford noted that is also lower than statewide school construction project averages, which ranged from \$633 to over

not get the bond and reconstruct the school, the expenses each year to keep it together would rise. and tax rates would increase exponentially every year. If the bond vote passes, they would take a couple of months to finalize the details of the construction. 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## Cross writing

What is cross writing? I can only speak from my own experience from handling these early pieces of ephemera. In my 50 years buying and selling early letters and other old documents, I have only seen a handful of cross letters. Here is one I managed to hang on to. I think some will find this interesting.

It's really difficult to read - and this is on both sides of a 7.5-inch by 9.5-inch piece of paper. The author was competent writing with a quill pen. Probably it was a gold nib, housed in an abalone or wooden pen-shaped instrument. She knew when to dip the nib in the ink, to reload the nib with ink, and continue writing. It is flawless, with very fine letters.

In those days, penmanship was taught in schools. The paper has yellowed, and the old iron-based ink turned brown, and soiled some, so it's difficult to read, but here is some of what I can make out. There

is more to be gleaned from this letter.

The photo with this article is a close-up of a small section of the letter. I'm not sure how well it will reproduce on newsprint. Read what you can, and then turn the newspaper 90 degrees to your right, to continue reading. In part, it reads:

"Proctorsville, Vt, March 13th, 1850

My dearest [illegible], I do wish that it were in my power to write you an interesting letter, full of life and good spirits, but I am dull and what is worse so nervous that I scarcely know what I am about. Your blessed letter of Feb. 20th is safely here and having only delayed one day I hasten to send this envelope full to you ['full to you' is in reference to cross writing]..."


It then goes on for a page regarding how others are doing or gifts received. The letter continues:

"...I am very happy when I think of you at Anchonca. I hope the pleasure you enjoy there may be some reward for the tears you shed while you prepared for

do not regret having gone there or the consequent trip to Mississippi. It is one of the pleasantest events I ever think of. I have been solicited to teach here, the older school this summer. I would not hesitate could I make my parents more comfortable or happy, to undertake the task, but as I can not accomplish any thing for them I intend to go to Mr. Mason's as soon as the travelling is good and remain till I go Westward. They very cordially invite me to do so. I have written to Mifs Coxe and shall know, I presume before I write you again what my prospect will be for returning to Cincinnati. If she does not wish me to teach with her, I must make some other plan. I have not told you that I have received a letter from the Trustees of Favette Academy. The Rev. Mr. Curtis of New Orleans is expected to take the academy. He is Methodist and is recommend-

## AI and the Rumsey Map Collection in genealogy

WINDHAM COUNTY, Vt. - On Saturday, Feb. 3, from 11 a.m. - 1 p.m., the Windham County Genealogy Interest Group (WCGIG) will present two topics: "Using Artificial Intelligence in Genealogy," and "Using the David Rumsey Map Collection for Genealogy," over Zoom only. Please register at www.bit. ly/WCGIGFEB2024. А Zoom link will be sent before the meeting. Pose any questions you have when you register.

Wayne Blanchard, coof Windham founder County Genealogy Interest Group and genealogy volunteer at Rockingham Library, will give us his insights into artificial intelligence (AI) and its current and future use in genealogy. Artificial intelligence is expanding into all sorts of areas, and genealogy is no exception. Although it can't replace the human genealogist, some of the new tools can be very helpful. AI is used in colorizing black and white photos, translating records into another language, transcribing and indexing records or newspaper articles, extracting and summarizing information from a document, and creating a genealogical sketch of an ancestor. Companies such as Ancestry and My Heritage are beginning to incorporate AI in their websites to support users in their family research. Wayne Blanchard has been experimenting with some of these tools, and he will share what he has learned. Jerry Carbone of Whetstone Brook Genealogy will discuss the massive map collection, using the David Rumsey Map Collection for genealogy. The David Rumsey Map Collection at Stanford University began in 1966, and contains more than 200,000 maps, 128,000 of which are online. The collection focuses on rare maps from the 1550s through the present day. The collection's scope is worldwide, but is very strong on various maps of the United States. The collection includes at-

lases, globes, wall maps, school geographies, pocket maps, books of exploration, maritime charts, and a variety of cartographic materials including pocket, wall, children's, and manuscript maps. Maps of importance for genealogical use are property, insurance, railroad, military, and topographic maps. The presentation will focus on how to find the maps and use the various tools that are part of the collection.

The Windham County Genealogy Interest Group is an informal organization whose members are dedicated to genealogy education, research, and best practices. Meetings are held every other month on Zoom. Many of these sessions were recorded and are available on the WCGIG YouTube Channel at www. bit.ly/WCGIGVIDEO. They cover topics such as improving your search results in www.familysearch.org and www.ancestry.com; using family tree software; navigating the crowd sourced cemetery database Find A Grave; using land records for genealogy research; using www.americanancestors. org, the database of the New England Historical Genealogical Society; and finding people in the newly released 1950 U.S. Census.

WCGIG is also supported by Brooks Me-Library morial in Brattleboro, Vt., and Rockingham Free Library in Bellows Falls, Vt., with use of their Zoom accounts, publicity, and use of their facilitie

"Sharing our creative work is a great way to connect with others and build new connections. The arts can also help people achieve a sense of purpose and personal growth, and can have a positive impact on social, emotional, mental, and physical health," he continued.

Instructor Evie Lovett is excited about the collaboration between the participants and herself. 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




