The celebration was created and organized by several of Josh's bandmates and music friends from the past 20 years, who all wanted to help ease the sudden financial burden placed on his family. The special 12-hour "family friendly" event featured seven area bands, many of

which featured musicians who had recorded and performed with Josh.

The bands performing included Just The Tip, Off The Hook, Rust And Ruin, Tothar, Curst, Vale End, and Day to Attend. There was also an "open jam session" to conclude the festivities.

Several area businesses were gracious in donating some \$1,400 worth of prizes and gift certificates to support the raffles throughout the day. The celebration raised a total of \$3,300, with all proceeds going directly to the Mosher family.

## **Grafton Fire** Department celebrates 100-year history

GRAFTON, Vt. - On Saturday, July 20, the Grafton Trails and Outdoor Center will host the annual Food and Antique Tractor Festival,

from 11 a.m. – 3 p.m. Along with music, food, arts and crafts, a silent auction, and a raffle to win one of two locally made quilts, there will be the opportunity to donate to the Windham County Humane Society through a purchase from Phinney's Phriends, or a tarot card reading for your dog or cat courtesy of Anuszka.

Of course, the festival will feature an array of antique tractors, as well as a cash bar with beer and wine provided by the Grafton Inn.

A bonus this year will be the return of the town square dance, in honor of the 100th anniversary of Grafton Volunteer Fire and Rescue Squad. Dancing will take place under a tent at the outdoor center from 6-10 p.m., called by Don Stratton, local musician and biologist at the University of Vermont.

## The Chester Festival to celebrate 50 years

CHESTER, Vt. - This September, the Chester Festival on the Green will be celebrating its 50th anniversary with more fun and entertainment for the whole family. This extensive fall market features more than 70 regional artisans selling handmade products, including jewelry, glass, pottery, fine woodwork, fiber art, and photography. There will also be food and refreshment vendors.

Held on Chester's historic Common, this year's festival is expanding its Vermont Culture Corner with a new maker's space of artists performing live demonstrations. Festival-goers are invited to watch and learn about everything from glass blowing and ceramics, to chainsaw carving and maple syrup boiling. They will be treated to live music, street performances, historical tours, games, sheep herding, and other animal encounters.

This two-day event will be held Sept. 21, from 9 a.m. - 5 p.m., and Sept. 22, from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m., rain or shine. Admission is free.

Nestled in the rolling hills of southern Vermont, the Chester Festival on the Green was established in 1974 by a small group of artists looking to celebrate harvest season and sell their wares. For one weekend every September, they gathered on the Town Common (known colloquially as "the Green"), where

locals and leaf peepers converged at shops and restaurants.

Later, various local groups, including the Chester Rotary Club, formalized planning and fundraising initiatives that helped solidify the Chester Festival as a hallmark celebration of Vermont culture. By the mid-2000s, festival grounds stretched far beyond the Green and hosted thousands of people annually. In 2020, planning and

Catch Me If You Can

Our parents bought the old farmhouse with all the attached barns and outbuildings just before I started my sophomore year at Chester High School. Time passed. The family dispersed and my brother Kim ended up living in the farmhouse. He and a cousin of ours ran an antiques and collectables business there. All the barns and outbuildings were filled with artifacts from the past, and all were for sale.

My wife and I, and our young daughter often visited my brother. My daughter loved to visit there. She liked her uncle and liked looking in all the barns full of history. Any kid would have liked it there. In addition to the buildings, there were a few chickens running loose and a pet potbellied pig. There was a swing set and lots of room to run

One summer day we were visiting. We were all outside in the front yard when Kim's phone rang and we learned our mother had been taken to Springfield Hospital. My wife and I thought we should go to the hospital but realized our daughter Jody, would probably be a problem. We talked to Kim about it and decided he would watch Jody. We wouldn't be gone too long.

I should mention that Kim is a paraplegic due to a horrible accident just after he had graduated high school in 1969. I should also mention that Jody, though only four years old was a very verbal, curious, inventive, and strong willed child. Her grandmother, my mother, was very strict and thought Jody needed discipline and instruction. Her grandfather, my dad, thought she was a hoot and very entertaining. Of course my wife and I loved her even when she was being naughty.

We told Jody we had to go to the hospital and would not be gone long, and that Kim was going to watch her while we were gone. We explained to her that she should be good and do what he asked her to do.

Jody looked at Kim in his wheelchair and declared that he couldn't even catch her. Of course we had misgivings and started to revise our plans.

Suddenly Kim made a snatch into the air over his head. He cupped his hands around something then brought them close to his face to peer between his fingers at what he might have caught. Jody came up close to her uncle and asked what he had.

"Here take a look," he said. When she leaned close to see, he grabbed her by the

When we returned from the hospital a couple hours later, Jody was standing on a chair at the kitchen sink with a way too big apron on, doing Kim's dishes, as she chatted happily away at him.

## Open House at the Athens Brick Meetinghouse

ATHENS, Vt. - The Athens Brick Meetinghouse will be the site of an old fashioned ice cream social on Sunday, July 21, from 2-4 p.m. The meetinghouse will be open for visitors to tour and learn more about this fascinating 1817 building. There will also be note cards available to purchase with pictures of the meetinghouse by the late Bill Sumner, renowned professional photographer.

The Athens Brick Meetinghouse is on the National Register of Historic Places, and is historically significant to the Windham County region. The Athens Meetinghouse came to be known as the "Mother Church" for the 12 towns

of Grafton, Rockingham, Townshend, Londonderry, Weston, Chester, Acton, Springfield, Landgrove, Windham, Putney, and Mount Holly, which comprised the "Old Athens Circuit." Circuit riders from Athens traveled out to these 12 towns by horse to perform religious services. Quarterly meetings with the Methodist congregants from these towns often lasted two days at the Athens Old Brick Church.

Originally erected to serve the spiritual needs of the residents of Athens and surrounding towns, the large open sanctuary which boasted a high pulpit, box pews, long side galleries, and a handsome chandelier was divided into two stories. The lower continued to be used for worship services, while the upper, a large hall, served the town's civic needs for Town Meetings and elections through the late

Members of the Athens Meetinghouse Committee and the Athens Historic Preservation Society will be on hand to answer questions and lead visitors on tours of this historic gem. Donations are welcome, but not required. Proceeds support the preservation of the meetinghouse.



**REGION** - As another anniversary of the cataround of major flooding strophic July 2023 floods, coursed through Vermont damaged homes, roads, and forced evacuations in a state still feeling the impact of last year's disaster.

But the generosity of friends, neighbors, and people who care can make a difference. The Vermont Flood Response and Recovery Fund, created by the Vermont Community Foundation immediately after the July 2023 floods, is again poised to respond and accept donations from people who want to help. To date, the fund has raised nearly \$14 million, and granted or allocated funds to support efforts in more than 100 communities across Vermont.

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



On July 3, 2024, the Selectboard of the Town of Chester, Vermont, adopted an "Ordinance Regulating Domestic Animals" pursuant to the authority granted in 24 V.S.A. § 2291(14), and (15), and 24 V.S.A. Chapter 59. This notice is published pursuant to 24 V.S.A. § 1972 to inform the public of the adoption of this ordinance and of the citizens' right to petition for a vote to disapprove the adoption of this ordinance.

## CONCISE SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE

The purpose of this Ordinance is to promote the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the Town and to preserve the quiet enjoyment of their property through the abatement of public nuisances associated with the keeping of Domestic Animals, including, but not limited to: the significant danger they pose to the traveling public and the damage they can cause to private and public property when running-at-large; their ability to produce noise detrimental to the enjoyment of life, property, and the conduct of business; and the risk they pose of transmitting communicable diseases to people and other animals, when not properly confined.

The full text of the ordinance may be examined at the Chester Town office at 556 Elm Street in Chester, Vermont, and may be examined during regular office hours.

CITIZENS' RIGHT TO PETITION FOR VOTE

Title 24 V.S.A. § 1973 grants citizens the right to petition for a vote at a special or annual Town Meeting to disapprove the adoption of the ordinance by the Selectboard. To exercise this right, citizens must present to the Selectboard or the Town Clerk a petition for a vote on the question of disapproving the adoption of the ordinance signed by not less than five percent (5%) of the Town's qualified voters. The petition must be presented within forty-four (44) days following the date of the adoption of the ordinance. Unless a petition requesting a vote is filed pursuant to 24 V.S.A. § 1973, the adopted "Ordinance Regulating Domestic Animals" shall become effective sixty (60) days from the date of said adoption.


Tickets include entry into our garden-themed gift raffle, featuring floral pillows, a gift basket filled with Mount Holly produced products, and a hanging flower basket.
