Okemo celebrates platinum anniversary

LUDLOW, Vt. – Seventy years ago, on Jan. 31, 1956, Okemo Mountain Resort first welcomed visitors for their inaugural season. At that time, the ski area featured four trails and two surface lifts, including what was then the longest surface lift in the country, the Red Poma lift, measuring in at 6,207 feet.

Improvements and expansion continued through the years at the popular winter destination, and, at the start of the 1961-62 season, the mountain reported a record 4,700 skiers over the three-day New Year's weekend. By early 1969, Okemo opened the new summit

complex, and by Christmas of that year, the mountain was reporting that ticket sales were 40% ahead of the previous winter.

Tim and Diane Mueller took over as sole owners during the 1992-1993 season, and kept pace with current ski trends and innovations. Okemo installed the area's first triple chairlift, the first detachable quad, advertised as "the world's fastest high-speed quad," and constructed a \$1.2 million summit lodge. The Sunburst Express was installed in 2014, featuring the landmark Orange Bubbles, a six-pack chairlift with heated seats.

In 2018, Vail Resorts purchased Okemo, and has continued to commit to making improvements

at the mountain, including significant snowmaking upgrades, the most recent via a partnership with Efficiency Vermont.

"These upgrades mean

more snow, faster coverage, and a better start to the season, all while operating more sustainably," reported Samara Sausville, communications manager for Vail

Resorts. "This directly supports our Commitment to Zero, Vail Resorts' sustainability goal of achieving a zero net operating footprint by 2030."

These days, Okemo sees between 500,000-600,000 visitors annually, and manages more than 120 trails and 21 lifts. Vail continues to host signature events throughout the year, including upcoming celebrations in recognition of Okemo's 70th anniversary.

The mountain is excitedly preparing to commemorate opening day on Jan. 31, with an apres party in the Jackson Gore courtyard, featuring a set from DJ Fly Ty, (@mrlifeofyourparty). Festivities will be kicking off at 2 p.m., and guests are en-

couraged to take the morning to enjoy the mountain, then apres the afternoon away.

Before the end of the 2026 ski season, Okemo visitors can look forward to several signature events, including the Let it Glow Winter Ice Festival, scheduled for March 14; the Okemo Parks Halfpipe Jam, set for March 28; and The Snowmelt: Slush Cup and Spring Fling, planned for April 4. Additionally, surprise, pop-up experiences are planned throughout the season.

With the recent storm dumping around 18 inches of fresh powder on the mountain, the current season is shaping up to be an excellent one – not too shabby, for 70.

Chester addresses budget deficit

CHESTER, Vt. – The Chester Selectboard met on Wednesday, Jan. 21, for their second regular meeting of the new year.

The board heard from Tim Jones and Don Mills, of Green Mountain Power (GMP), concerning an upcoming power line replacement project along on Lovers Lane slated to begin in May. Jones, GMP program manager, told the board that the project would begin "just north of the rec fields,"

and proceed to Randall Road. Power lines, according to Jones, will be 90% underground, at a depth of 48-50 inches. The project will require significant disturbance to the road surface, and as such, GMP will rebuild the road at the project's end, at their own expense, as well as replace a culvert, Jones said.

Jones said he anticipates that the work will take "a couple of weeks," and that during this time there will be traffic control and road closures.

Board Vice Chair Arne

Jonynas asked Jones if towns are ever reimbursed for granting GMP rights of way, and Jones responded that that has not been common practice. "Our carrot is we're rebuilding the road," Jones said, though he welcomed the board's "feedback" on the matter.

Mills explained that "towns have definitely benefited from brand new culverts" and other work GMP does during its projects, saying, "We're actually saving the towns money in a lot of cases." Jonynas acknowledged that the road would

likely be returned to better shape than it is currently in by GMP.

The board then began discussions of the town's 2026 general fund budget. Hance inaugurated the discussion by saying that she would like to "put on the record and [give] some clarity about the deficit discussion we've been having."

Hance explained that the town's numbers did not reflect a budget deficit at the end of 2024, and that, in June 2025, when the auditors with whom the town works completed their audit

for 2024, they did not alert her to any abnormalities, and so she did not thoroughly review the audit. It was not until October 2025 that Hance became aware of the 2024 deficit, at which time she said she noticed "discrepancies" in the audit. "There were double entries of things, and things that didn't look right," Hance stated, saying she then reached out to the auditors, who agreed that there were issues with the audit. At that time, Hance said, she agreed with the auditors that the corrections to 2024 would

be handled at the same time as the audit for 2025, beginning at the end of February 2026. In the mean time, Hance continued, there is not clarity as to how much of a deficit exists, or how any deficit could have occurred in the first place.

"I just simply don't have answers...the auditors have to give us the answers," Hance told the board. "By our numbers, we weren't in a deficit."

Hance said she had avoided raising the issue publicly

Londonderry talks open meeting law, grant opportunities

LONDONDERRY, Vt. – On Jan. 20, the Londonderry Selectboard discussed the responsibility of open meeting law. Town administrator Aileen Tulloch reported that she brought this to the board's attention a month ago, and "things haven't gotten better since then."

Tulloch stated that two more meetings, of the conservation committee and the

housing commission, had not been warned properly, and had to be cancelled as a result. She explained that time and accuracy were major factors in this problem. Agendas, she said, are being sent to the town office extremely late, and the staff does not feel comfortable posting things that are not accurate or legal, given that agendas aren't being posted within the timeframe that state statute requires prior to the meeting being held. Tull-

och reiterated that state law says it is the responsibility of each committee to abide by open meeting laws.

Board member Taylor Prouty asked if, given the proper documents were sent in a timely manner, the town staff could continue to assist in posting agendas to the website. He added that he can sympathize with both sides, but, "if [the town staff doesn't] offer some help, then we could potentially lose a lot of volunteers." He suggested

composing one document that can be distributed to every committee, containing all of the guidelines, state statutes, and criteria in order for the town to assist in posting agendas.

Tulloch agreed to create a checklist, which will be signed by the selectboard. Tulloch also offered that, if anyone wanted to sit down and go over open meeting law, she would be happy to do so.

It was announced that Jen

Greenfield resigned from the planning commission. Prouty said that it was apparently related to a heavier workload with posting agendas. "That's a read that we had," stated Prouty.

Short-term rental (STR) administrator Andy Dahlstrom then reported that the season has begun to look at the STR ordinance, and a committee has been formed. He invited anyone interested in learning or contributing feedback to attend the meet-

ings in person or online, on the first and third Mondays, at 5 p.m.

Liam Elio, representing the town hall renovation committee, said that there are a few small projects that are not Municipal Energy Resilience Program (MERP) approved, but need to be done, such as a perimeter drain. He requested use of some of the 2026 building reserve fund for these projects, of which

Ludlow awarded planning grant to develop master plan

LUDLOW, Vt. – The Vermont Agency of Transportation (AOT) and the Agency of Commerce and Community Development (ACCD) awarded \$67,500 to the town and village of Ludlow in Better Connections Grant funds to develop a master plan that outlines a unified vision for transportation improvements in the village center, surrounding neighborhoods, and key destinations to support vibrant, year-round economic activity. The town is providing a 10% match in the amount of \$7,500, for a total funding amount of \$75,000 for

professional services. The Better Connections Grant Program seeks to help cities and towns build stronger communities that are more livable and walkable. Ludlow will have a year and a half to complete this project.

“The updated Ludlow Village Master Plan will provide an actionable roadmap for transportation, parking, access management, housing, and land use decisions that align with Vermont’s Better Connections, Smart Growth, and Act 181 planning principles,” said Ludlow town manager Penny Wu.

“Vermont’s downtowns and village centers are economic drivers, and enhance

Vermont’s quality of life, as well as our brand,” said Gov. Phil Scott.

The Program is led by the Vermont Agency of Transportation (AOT) and the Vermont Agency of Community Development, in collaboration with the Vermont Agency of Natural Resources and the Vermont Department of Health. until she had gathered enough information, explaining that this is a result of her “legal background,” and that she feels that “it gets very messy when you put half-facts and half-truths out in a public discussion.”

“In my experience,” Hance said, “[it] does not usually end well.”

Resident Bill Lindsay then spoke to the board, saying he had attempted to read the audit, though, “As a layman...[the audit] is extremely difficult to read.” Lindsay felt that

the town’s current attempts to hire a financing director are an “excellent corrective action,” and that, in his opinion, this person should report directly to the selectboard at meetings, so that the board can review the town’s finances at intervals during the year. Hance told Lindsay that what he described is something that is being included in the position’s job description.

Further budget discussions focused on cuts in the 2026 budget, as well as any other possible mitigation strategies for the deficit when it becomes clear what the total amount is. Board member Arianna Knapp

suggested adding money into the budget for the town’s reserve fund, to account for the deficit, as well as possibly for future contingencies. The board agreed, and settled on the amount of \$40,000, raising the 2026 budget increase from about 6% to a total of 7.12%. The general fund budget was then approved to be voted on at Town Meeting, totaling \$4,461,054.94.

The Chester Selectboard will hold their next meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 4, at 6:30 p.m., at the Chester Town Hall.

Board Chair Tom Cavanaugh said he could count on about \$150,000, from the \$250,000 that would be allocated to the fund this year.

Karen Geraghty, grant writer from KG Consulting, then discussed further grant opportunities for the town. She said it was unfortunate that the town was denied the Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) grants, and relayed that the funding was approved to towns that had projects more directly related to housing development.

Geraghty reported that there are two other grant opportunities from Northern Borders Regional Commission and Economic Development Administration (EDA). The Northern Borders grant has eligibility for up to \$1 million in funding, and specifically lists wastewater projects as a criterion. The EDA grant has eligibility for between \$2-20 million in funding, but the town would be competing in a larger pool of applicants given that this is a national grant. She said the town meets all of the requirements for both grants, and recommended the town apply for both, to which the board agreed.

The Londonderry Selectboard meets the first and third Monday of every month, at 6 p.m.

“River Memories” at Rockingham Library

BELLOWS FALLS, Vt. – On Saturday, Feb. 7, from 1-2:30 p.m., please join the Rockingham Free Public Library for a presentation sponsored by Vermont Humanities, entitled “River Memories: Exploring Settlement Patterns on Waterways in Vermont.”

Devastating recent rain events, including in July 2023 and 2024, and Tropical Storm Irene in 2011, have demonstrated that many communities in Vermont are vulnerable to damage from flooding. In this presentation, historian Alan Berolzheimer examines how the

Thomae's journey reflects not only the evolution of a transformative program, but also her unwavering dedication to the wellbeing of children and families.

In 1992, while pursuing her graduate degree in therapy at Antioch University in New Hampshire, Thomae embarked on her first internship. This internship, through The Family Place,

placed her in a pilot program at the State Street School in Windsor. Collaborating with Jo Levkoff and school counselor Mary Bronga, Thomae worked closely with students and their families in what was then an experimental initiative.

Among her cherished memories is organizing a boys' group where she led activities ranging from basketball games to innovative drumming sessions. Using soft pom-poms on sticks, the boys created rhythmic beats on a drum – until a teacher upstairs intervened due to the noise. These activities, combined with Thomae's educational expertise, allowed her to connect deeply with the children, many of whom faced challenges at home.

In 1993, HCRS formally established its Success Be-

yond Six services within the children's division, and Thomae was among its first clinicians. Thomae brought her invaluable experience from the pilot program to this new initiative.

Thomae transitioned to Woodstock Elementary School as a school-based clinician. Unlike traditional office-based therapy, being embedded within the school allowed Thomae to observe her clients in their natural environment, and tailor her therapeutic interventions accordingly.

Thomae's time with HCRS concluded in 1997, when she pursued another passion, teaching drama. However, her impact on HCRS' school-based services remains foundational. Thomae's pioneering efforts and innovative spirit helped shape a program that continues to provide critical support to students and their families.

As we continue to build on the foundation she helped establish with an HCRS program that today serves more than 200 students across 15 local school districts, we are honored to recognize Thomae for her contributions and her enduring legacy in school-based mental health services.

James R. Storey, 1947-2026



honoring eccentric African explorer Captain Jeffrey T. Spaulding (Groucho Marx). The film serves as a vehicle for the Marx brothers' comedy and absurdist routines, with a minimal plot loosely structured around the theft of a valuable painting. In "Soup to Nuts," Mr. Schmidt's costume store is bankrupt because he spends his time on Rube Goldberg-style inventions. His creditors send a young manager, who falls for Schmidt's niece Louise. Things come to a slapstick head when Louise needs rescuing from a fire. The runtime is 2 hours 50 minutes, with a brief intermission.


