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Claremont School Board says sports programs will be funded

CLAREMONT, N.H. – At the Wednesday, Feb. 4, meeting of the Claremont School Board, New Hampshire State Rep. Hope Damon updated the board on House Bill 1399. Calling it “a long shot effort,” Damon detailed the push for a \$5 million appropriation to the Claremont School District. Damon said the funds would be “a retroactive payment for the building aid project that was done at Stevens High School during the moratorium.” The bill is expected to continue moving up the house chain of command for the finance committee to approve sometime this month. “I would encourage anybody who wants to see this

money come to Claremont,” Damon commented, “to not only contact your local state reps, of which you have five, [but] much sooner, if you go online to ‘Gen Court N.H.’ the website for the House, [you] can go to the finance committee and get the names of the individuals involved.” Currently, the website cannot accept citizen’s comments online, so Damon strongly suggested Claremont residents email or call those individuals directly. Senior comptroller Matt Angell addressed concerns he said he’s been hearing from teachers regarding cash balances. “I want to make sure teachers understand that our cash balances are fine,” Angell stated. “When I talk about loans, the loan is the revolving

line of credit...[and] right now we are not borrowing against it.” Angell stated the district has about \$3 million in the bank, which should carry them through the month. “If we have to borrow any money,” Angell expressed, “it [would] be less than \$50,000 just to get us through.” The district anticipates needing to borrow money in March, but plans to pay the loan off at the start of April utilizing their final adequacy payment. “What we receive for the remainder of the year should carry us through the rest of the year.” Interim Superintendent Kerry Kennedy announced that the Annual Report “is going to the printers very soon and will be...ready ahead of the March 10 vot-

ing day.” After returning from a nonpublic meeting session, the board set the tuition rates for fiscal year 2027 at \$15,000 for elementary schools, \$15,500 for middle school, and \$17,000 for high school, based on Angell’s recommendations. School board member Candace Crawford presented the meeting with recent findings pertaining to funding athletics across the district. “At our last meeting,” Crawford said, “the school board set the 2026-2027 proposed budget at \$42,957,714. In that budget, the allocated funds for athletics were \$1. The administration was tasked with finding changes in line items that could be made to free up funds for athletics.” New Hampshire law allows

the board to transfer money between budget line items. Crawford stressed that the board supports athletics and is aware of their important role as part of the educational experience. She reported that members of the school board and administration reviewed the budget and were able to identify some sources for funding athletics. The discovery of two duplicate entries amounted to a savings of approximately \$250,000. A savings of \$450,000 came from a request from Stevens High School for additional teachers that was subsequently withdrawn. The reconfiguration of “a couple of support programs with limited enrollments that are not mandated [will] free up another \$150,000,” Crawford stated.

Michael Petrin, vice chair, commented that it was time to stop “rubber stamping” programs without reviewing cost and benefit each year. Crawford stated that, although they may have discovered \$850,000 in potential savings, they were not obligated to spend it on athletics, or at all. The board gratefully accepted a \$15,000 donation from The Byrne Foundation to help fund the Claremont Middle School eighth grade field trip to the Boston Museum of Science. Kennedy told the board the amount will cover “not all, but a good chunk” of the cost of the trip. The school board’s next regular meeting will be Wednesday, Feb.18, at the Sugar River Valley Technical Center.

Cheesemakers winning medals

WESTMINSTER WEST, Vt. – Cheesemakers Peter Dixon and his wife Rachel Fritz Schaal, of Parish Hill Creamery in Westminster West, Vt., have been making cheese and perfecting their craft for more than five de-

cades, and over the years, the work has certainly paid off. Recently, the creamery's own West West Blue Cheese has won a prestigious Super Gold award at the Guild of Fine Foods' World Cheese Awards.

Held at the BernExpo in Berlin, Switzerland, the Guild of Fine Foods is an organization that champions independent food and drink retailers, producers, wholesalers, and distributors. This year's event featured cheesemakers from over 40 countries worldwide.

This award-winning blue cheese is also created with local milk that comes from grass-fed herds exclusively at the Elm Lea Farm, located at the Putney School, making this cheese an especially home-grown product. The West West Blue Cheese was also the only Vermont-made cheese to win a Super Gold award at this event.

Parish Hill Creamery cur-

rently produces 15 varieties of cheeses, and an estimated 20,000 pounds of cheese annually.

Parish Hill Creamery also won six other cheese awards at the event, including a gold medal for their cheese Reverie; silver medals for their Kashar, Jack's Blue, Idyll, and Humble; and a bronze medal for the Vermont Herdsman. They also won a Super Gold award in 2024 for their Jack's Blue. Winning a Super Gold indicates one of the top 103 "exceptional" cheeses in the world.

Other Vermont-area cheesemakers are creating award-winning products as well, including the Grafton Village Cheese Company, whose Shesog cheese, made with local sheep's milk, was awarded a bronze medal at the event. Additionally, Jasper Hill Farm in Greensboro, Vt., also won a medal for their Withersbrook Blue Cheese.



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Windham Regional Priority Projects announced

REGION – Brattleboro Development Credit Corporation (BDCC), the economic development organization for Windham County, announces the Regional Priority Projects (RPP) list for 2026. The annual list ranks the top 10 priority projects as determined by a committee made up of members from BDCC, the Windham Regional Commission, and representatives from across Windham County.

Each year, regional development organizations across Vermont gather input from planning commissions, municipalities, partner organizations, and

local stakeholders to identify projects that reflect shared goals across the region. Engagement efforts include public meetings, newsletters, direct outreach, and regional convenings. The information provided in the Regional Priority Projects lists are used by the State of Vermont to inform decision making for federal and state funding opportunities, and to guide community planning processes.

The project list-development process is consistent and neutral across all of the organizations that provide Regional Priority Projects lists to the state. Projects

selected often advance business retention and growth, workforce and talent development, broadband expansion, innovation in economic development, and improvements to critical infrastructure.

The Regional Priority Projects list identifies the initiatives that are most prepared to advance job creation, expand economic opportunities, and strengthen community resilience. The top-ranked projects on the Windham Regional Priority Projects list are submitted to the Vermont Agency of Commerce and Community Development (ACCD).

They, along with other state departments, use these lists to help inform future funding allocations for many of their programs, including Northern Border Regional Commission's annual funding.

The 2026 Windham Regional Priority Projects List is: Grace Cottage Family Health new primary care clinic building; Rockingham Industrial Park stormwater planning, design, and implementation; Route 9 water and wastewater infrastructure expansion project; Belows Falls Intermodal Transportation Center (BFITC); South Londonderry village

wastewater system, Phase II; Green Island Project, Great Falls Food Hub; Vernon Homes Greenhouse Project; WheelPad; Brattleboro Technology & Industrial Park; and the renovation project for the Old School Community Center.

BDCC collects projects across Windham and Bennington counties' Southern Vermont Economic Development Zone annually for consideration as CEDS Vital Projects, and also draws from this pool of projects for the RPP list. While there is often overlap, the RPP list requires projects to be well along in their planning and

The Fort at No. 4 enters new era in 2026

CHARLESTOWN, N.H. – The Fort at No. 4 is a place where stories live – stories of courage, conflict, cooperation, and everyday survival on one of colonial New England's most contested frontiers. In 2026, The Fort is stepping confidently into a new chapter, one defined by expanded programming, revitalized exhibit spaces, and a renewed invitation to the surrounding community to help shape the future of this historic site.

The year begins in February, with "Midwinter at No. 4: A Day of Winters Past" on Saturday, Feb. 21. Winter was one of the most demanding seasons for colonial families and garrison communities. This program highlights how people endured cold, hunger, isolation, and uncertainty, using period skills and ingenuity, and how they enjoyed their lives and the close company of each other.

In early March, The Fort reaches beyond its walls to participate in the Colonial Trade Fair in Dover, New Hampshire, on March 7 and 8. Events like this strengthen regional connections and bring awareness of the Fort's mission to broader audiences.

April brings Clash of Cultures weekend on April 11 and 12, marking a pivotal moment in the season. Designed specifically for those curious about reenacting or volunteering, this immersive program explores the cultural intersections and conflicts of the 18th-century frontier.

Opening weekend, May 2 and 3, celebrates the official start of The Fort's public season. The air fills with movement as interpreters return, exhibits reopen, and the grounds once again come alive with activity.

Education and skill-building take center stage in mid-May, with the hearth cooking class with Becky Hendricks, on May 16 and 17. These popular classes connect visitors directly with the rhythms of 18th-century domestic life.

Later in the month, "Original Rendezvous," from May 22-24 brings together traders, reenactors, and history enthusiasts for a weekend that celebrates commerce, craftsmanship, and cross-cultural exchange.

One of the most ambitious undertakings for 2026 is a season-long exploration of the American Revolution, the "Echoes of 1776 Revolutionary War" series, a multievent exploration of the Revolutionary era as experienced on the frontier. Rather than focusing solely on battles, this series examines the war through personal, social, and moral lenses. This series will be featured on the last Saturday of the month, May through October.

Family-friendly and youth-focused program-

ming remains a cornerstone of The Fort's mission. "Allies & Adversaries: The French & Indian War" at The Fort at No. 4, on June 6 and 7, provides context for the conflicts that shaped the region before the Revolution, while Children's Living History Day on July 18 invites younger visitors to learn through play, exploration, and hands-on activities.

The Fort also embraces creative partnerships, hosting River Theater's production of "Charlotte's Web" across two weekends: June 13 and 14, and June 20 and 21. By combining literature, performance, and historic setting, the Fort reaches new audiences and reinforces its role as a cultural hub.

Summer programming continues with John Maynard Day, on July 4 and 5, commemorating 280 years since Maynard's map creation and 250 years since the Declaration of Independence. This event blends scholarship, celebration, and reflection, reminding visitors that the stories of independence are rooted in specific places and people.

August brings specialized and culturally significant programs, including

Artillery School with Jon Soule on Aug. 1 and 2, and "Abenaki at the Trading Post & Pequawket Garrison" on Aug. 8 and 9. These events deepen interpretive accuracy, and center Indigenous perspectives that are essential to understanding the region's past.

As autumn arrives, The Fort's programming shifts to reflection, transition, and tradition. "Return to No. 4: Revolutionary War," on Sept. 12 and 13, brings a reenactment of the Revolutionary War as it might have been on the banks of the Connecticut River, while "Out of Time," a unique timeline event on Sept. 26, allows visitors to move through multiple historical periods in a single day.

October features "Homestead 1777" on Oct. 10, and the ever-popular Harvest Dinner on Oct. 17, a special ticketed event that blends food, history, and community. The season concludes with Native Heritage Weekend on Nov. 7 and 8, honoring Indigenous histories and living cultures with respect and depth.

Behind the scenes, just as much energy is being devoted to updating ex-

hibit spaces as to expanding programming. Visitors will notice improved interpretive signage, refreshed interiors, and exhibits designed to be more interactive and inclusive. The goal is not to modernize for its own sake, but to make The Fort's stories clearer, richer, and more engaging for today's audiences.

None of this work happens without people. Volunteers are the lifeblood of The Fort at No. 4, and 2026 rep-

resents an open invitation to the community to get involved. Volunteers assist with interpretation, education, maintenance, gardening, events, research, and visitor services.

The Plan repeals the charters of both the Town and the Village and replaces them with the substance of the Plan as the charter for the Town. The Plan names the officers of the Town and their manner of election or appointment, the form of governance, the powers of the Selectboard, the establishment and organization of the Water and Sewer Board, the governance and operation of the Electric Department and authority of its Board, transitional provisions, and other matters related to the proposed merger and legal operation of the Town thereafter.

Part 380, the Office of Energy Projects has reviewed the applications for relicense for the Vernon Hydroelectric Project (Vernon Project) (FERC No. 1904), Bellows Falls Hydroelectric Project (Bellows Falls Project) (FERC No. 1855), and Wilder Hydroelectric Project (Wilder Project) (FERC No. 1892) and has prepared a final environmental impact statement (EIS) for the projects. The projects are located on the Connecticut River in Windsor, Windham, and Orange counties, Vermont, and Sullivan, Cheshire, and Grafton counties, New Hampshire.

The final EIS contains staff’s analysis of the applicants’ proposals and the alternatives for relicensing the Vernon, Bellows Falls, and Wilder projects. The final EIS documents the views of governmental agencies, non-governmental organizations, affected Native-American tribes, the public, the license applicant, and Commission staff.

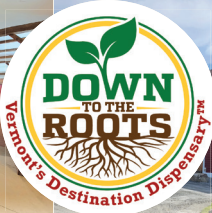


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Paintings by Finn Campman
