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Cleanup at 30 Henry Street in Bellows Falls to be completed by end of year

ROCKINGHAM, Vt. – Project engineer David Jenson, of Stone Environmental, gave a report to the Rockingham Selectboard on Sept. 1 regarding the EPA brownfield cleanup activity at 30 Henry Street, the home of the Bellows Falls Community Bike Project (BFCBP). Jenson said the company has been overseeing work at BFCBP to address environmental concerns related to site contamination from “historical sources,” which pose a potential threat to the quality of the indoor air.

Stone Environmental began looking into clean-up requirements at the

location in 2024. Since beginning the work, Jenson said, it has removed more contaminated soil than initially estimated, which must be transported off site to a landfill equipped to take hazardous materials.

Jenson reported that that work will start in the near future, and he hoped to have everything completed by the end of the year.

Town Manager Aaron Patt also presented his report, which included an update on the bond funds for the Bellows Falls Opera House roof. Patt reported the town received the final \$798,000, and first payments will start next year.

“So, that whole cycle,” said Patt, “which you have

all been part of all the way through, is now complete.”

A couple of items not on the night’s agenda were brought up by Bellows Falls resident Tim Knight, who first took a moment to thank the selectboard for acting to remove campers that had been parked in the Rockingham Park and Ride lot.

Knight also asked the board to address the situation he observed at the Rodeway Inn in Bellows Falls. The motel suffered damage from a fire in May, and, according to Knight, it seems some people have taken up residence in several of the rooms. “What is the latest on that?” asked Knight. “Are they going to fix it? Tear it down? Leave

it the way it is?”

Board Chair Rick Cowan said it was his understanding that some unhoused people were living there via the state voucher program, but he wasn’t 100% sure. Knight’s concern was that the main building of the motel seemed uninhabitable.

Patt concurred with Cowan’s take on the situation, and mentioned that he had held “a significant staff meeting” with the fire chief, police chief, and town zoning administrator to discuss the matter. Patt told Knight he believed there were funds in place to rebuild the central section of the building that had sustained most of the fire damage, and said he

would follow up and put the item on the agenda at a future meeting.

Further along the agenda, Patt, Cowan, and the selectboard held a brief discussion about setting up a town manager meet and greet event at the Rockingham Public Library. It was agreed that Thursday, Oct. 1, at 5 p.m., would be the target date and time, and once Cowan could confirm the availability of the library that night, he would lock in the schedule.

Finally, the board adjourned the regular selectboard meeting in order to conduct two executive sessions, one dealing with ongoing mediation between the town and Great River

Hydro.

The selectboard’s next meeting will be held Tuesday, Sept. 22, at 6 p.m.

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Springfield Rotary Club donates 16th Trex bench to Lions Club Dog Park

SPRINGFIELD, Vt. – The Springfield Rotary Club has donated its 16th Trex recycled-plastic bench to the Springfield Lions Club Dog Park, located at 5 School Street in North Springfield, continuing a community effort that has diverted more than seven tons of plastic film from the waste stream since February 2023.

The latest bench represents another milestone in the Rotary Club’s participation in the Trex Thin Film Plastics Challenge. The program encourages communities to collect hard-to-recycle plastic film and turn it into useful products rather than sending it to landfills.

the Springfield Food Co-op at 10%. Additional contributions came from Bibens Ace Hardware, Springfield Hospital, Springfield GMC, and Factorum Designs, of Waterbury.

Since the project began in February 2023, Springfield Rotary has collected 14,152 pounds of plastic film – more than 7 tons. That is approximately the weight of a large male white rhinoceros.

The Trex Challenge accepts a variety of plastic-film materials that are difficult to process through conventional recycling systems, including grocery and produce bags, bubble wrap, bread bags, and cereal liners. Plastic film can jam the machinery used at traditional recycling facilities, making specialized collection programs particularly important.

Collected plastic film is transported to Shaw’s Supermarket in Springfield, the Rotary Club’s local drop-off point and an important link in the recycling process. Rotary members bring the collected plastic to Shaw’s, where it begins the

Dartmouth Cancer Center celebrates inpatient oncology unit

LEBANON, N.H. – Dartmouth Cancer Center recently celebrated the opening of a new, 32-bed inpatient oncology unit at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center, expanding the capacity to provide complex cancer care, advanced cellular therapies, and clinical trials close to home for patients across northern New England.

The new unit, located on the second floor of the Patient Pavilion, is designed to support complex hematologic care; stem cell transplants; immune effector cell therapies, including CAR-T cell therapy; bispecific antibodies; and other emerging treatments. The unit also provides additional inpatient capacity for clinical trials involving novel cancer therapies.

Private patient rooms feature advanced, real-time monitoring and the ability to convert to intensive care when needed. Rooms can also provide positive airflow for patients whose immune systems require additional protection. The unit includes six dedicated infusion chairs to support the

delivery of outpatient CAR-T cell therapy.

"Just as important, this unit gives Dartmouth Cancer Center essential inpatient capacity to participate in clinical trials, including those developed with leading academic and industry partners," said Dr. Roy Herbst, director of Dartmouth Cancer Center. "Until now, limited dedicated inpatient space has constrained our ability to offer some of these studies. This floor changes that. It creates a bridge between discovery and delivery."

The unit is an important component of Dartmouth Cancer Center's Integrated Multidisciplinary Program

for Advanced Cell and Gene Therapies, or IMPACT, which brings together research, cell engineering, manufacturing, clinical trials, and patient care to advance emerging treatments. Valley Regional, Mount Ascutney hospitals launch joint nurse residency program

REGION – Mount Ascutney Hospital and Health Center (MAHHC) and Valley Regional Hospital (VRH), both members of Dartmouth Health, have launched joint nurse residency programs to support newly graduated registered nurses as they transition into professional practice while strengthening the regional healthcare workforce.

The inaugural summer launch includes four cohorts: one emergency department (ED) residency hosted at VRH and three medical-surgical residencies hosted at MAHHC. Future cohorts will take place regularly in January/February and July/August each year.

NRPs drastically improve first-year nurse retention rates to between 90% and

98%, compared to an average retention rate of only 70% for facilities operating without a structured transition program. Up to one-third of new graduate nurses leave their employer within their first two years due to stress and lack of support, making NRPs a critical intervention for workforce stability and advanced clinical training.

“Making the transition from nursing school to the bedside is one of the biggest steps in a nurse’s career,” said Christopher J. Laird, VRH’s chief nursing officer. “New graduates bring high energy and fresh clinical knowledge, but they need ongoing mentorship and hands-

on support. This residency program ensures they don’t have to make that transition alone, and our patients benefit from nurses who feel prepared, supported, and ready to lead.”

The ED residency at VRH is designed for both new graduates and experienced RNs transitioning into emergency nursing. Developed by the Emergency Nurses Association, the curriculum combines evidence-based education, simulation, progressive clinical immersion, and one-on-one mentorship. Michael J. Guest, an ED registered nurse at VRH, leads the program, which currently includes two nurse residents

from MAHHC.

At MAHHC, medical-surgical nurse residents complete an intensive three-week residency with the education team – integrating classroom learning, interactive sessions, skills, and simulations – followed by 12 or more weeks of guided clinical practice alongside dedicated preceptors and professional development specialists. Over the subsequent 10 months, residents reconvene for ongoing training involving topic reviews, simulations, and interactive learning exercises. Created by MAHHC’s nurse residency program coordinator and a nursing professional development specialist Karen L. Cote, this summer’s med-surg cohorts include 15 new nurses, four of whom are from VRH.

“Partnering across our two organizations allows us to combine clinical expertise, share best practices, and give new nurses a broader, richer training experience,” said Moriah J. Tidwell, chief nursing officer. “When hospitals work together, our employees and the entire community benefit.”

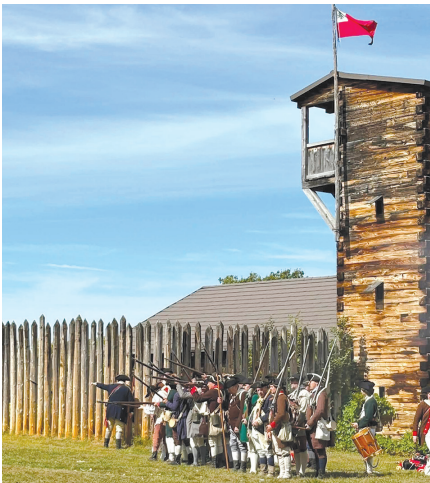

The centerpiece of the weekend is a dramatic Revolutionary War tactical demonstration and battle, bringing the sights, sounds, smoke, and confusion of the

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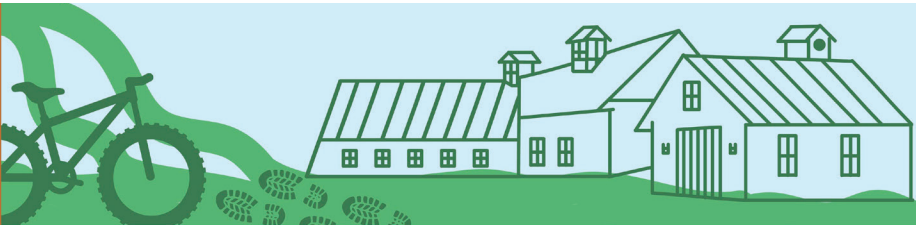
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Trails at Fletcher Farm Grand Opening

BRAT organizes several cleanups every year; culvert and stormwater cleanouts and mapping; planting of native vegetation on streambanks and floodplains; shoreline improvement projects to retain stormwater on the landscape and protect water quality; monitoring of sites on streams, lakes, and swimming holes for nutrients, chloride, bacteria, and other parameters; educational opportunities such as “bug hunts” to look at stream creatures, dragonfly surveys, and aquatic plant workshops; and more.
